The project includes the following streets:

Unit 65—Pacific Terrace from Portland to Del Mora streets; Portland street from Pacific Terrace to the Southern Pacific right of way; Eldorado street from Portland to Main street.

Unit 67—Blehn street from city limits to Oregon avenue;

Oregon avenue from Blehn street to intersection with Upham street; Donald street from Oregon avenue to Worden avenue; Grant street from Ninth to Tenth streets; Upham from Oregon to Prospect; Prospect from Upham to Rose.

Low Bid

To the accompaniment of "ohs" and "ahs" of surprise, the R. R. R. garage bid offering to supply the city with tires for 1928 at a 21 per cent discount was read and referred to the finance committee. The city fathers were amazed at the bid, holding it was the lowest received for city tires. No other offers were received.

Bids for supplying city automobiles and trucks with gas and oil for the year were received from the Standard, Union, Associated, and Shell Oil companies and were referred to the finance committee.

Bidding Close

Just one-third of a cent separated the bids of two Klamath Falls restaurants seeking to secure the prisoner feeding contract. The Owl cafe offered 33 cents per meal; the Green Lantern cafeteria, 33 and 1-3 cents. The bids were referred to the finance committee.

Two lots in an alley in block 38, Hot Springs addition, were closed last night when an ordinance providing for this move was adopted unanimously by the council.

Property abutting the alley will acquire equal portions of the alley property.

Owing to a misunderstanding of dates, bid for approximately \$100,000 of city improvement bonds were not opened last night. The bids will be opened next Tuesday night.

Puzzling Problem

Complaints against proprietors of the new Pelican hotel, the Willard hotel and the Grizzle hotel for pumping water from basements out onto their alleys gave rise to another puzzling and perplexing problem.

An ordinance forbidding sanitary sewers being used for the purpose of carrying of water from basements. Another ordinance forbids dumping water onto the alley. There is no storm sewer nearby. So what to do?

MERGER PLAN HEARING OVER MERGER OPENS

TACOMA, Wash., Feb. 7. (AP)—Taking up the fourth and what is expected to be the final public hearing on the case the interstate commerce commission opened the question of the Great Northern-Northern Pacific railway merger for the testimony of northwest interests here yesterday. Earn Brandt, Jr., and C. D. Mahaffie of the commission are in charge of the hearing. A small army of officials and legal talent represents the two railways directly, while the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific, which is opposing the consolidation, has witnesses and attorneys present.

The hearing is expected to take at least two days. Portland is favoring the consolidation. The state of Oregon also has approved the merger plan. Seattle has

thus far officially taken no position on either side.

Yakima, Ellensburg, Auburn and other cities of this state are also opposing the consolidation program.
