Worden from Portland—

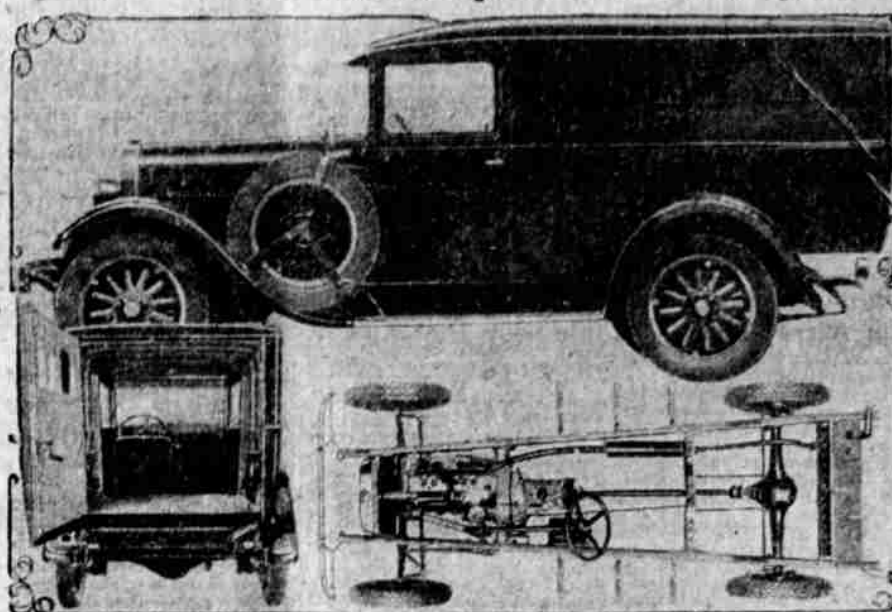
