



TAYLOR CLAIMS FOUL BUT JOEY SANGOR WINNER

Low Left Hook "On Border Line" Floors Bantam-weight Champion

CHICAGO, Feb. 10. (AP)—A "five minute count" wasn't long enough for Bud Taylor, world's champion bantamweight last night and he lost his fight with Joey Sangor, Milwaukee featherweight, in the seventh round. It was called a technical knockout, the first so far as the records show, over marked against Taylor's long ring record.

A low left hook sent Taylor down. Referee Phil Collins said the blow was "on the border line" Taylor's records claimed a foul.

After an examination by a physician and a consultation of the judges and referee, Taylor was given five minutes rest. At the end of that time he still was unable or unwilling to continue and the decision was given Sangor.

The fight which was to have gone 10 rounds was one of the most vicious a Chicago ring has shown in many months. Sangor outwitted the bantam king by slightly more than five pounds. His straight rights began shooting out with the first seconds of action, and Taylor's chin was a frequent mark for them.

Taylor on the other hand used left hooks, varied with an occasional jab, but the Milwaukee fighter kept coming in. There were bursts of championship power in which Taylor's fists flew to Sangor's face like hail.

The pace throughout was exceptionally fast.

U. of O. Plans To Send Stars East to Games

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 10. (AP)—Arrangements are being made by University of Oregon athletic officials to send several members of the various athletic teams of the University to the national college championships this summer.

Brad Harrison, tennis champion of Oregon, California and the Pacific northwest, having won three tournaments last year, is to be sent, according to present plans. It also is hoped to send another tennis star with him, to compete in the doubles.

Vic Wetzel, track captain and Ed Mueller, freshman weight man, also are expected to make the trip east, and will try out for the Olympics.

Johnny Anderson, swimming luminary, also is expected to go. He has lowered the conference record in the 150-yard backstroke and 40 yard dash, and in practice has bettered the mark in the 100 yard free style and 220 yard dash.

WHITMAN HOOP TEAM DEFEATS WILLAMETTE U.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Feb. 10. (AP)—Whitman last night maintained its lead in the north-west conference by defeating Willamette University 31 to 26 in a rough game, featured by spots of brilliant play.

The Whitman team had poor luck hitting the basket, and was trailing at the half 15 to 11. In the second half Willamette led most of the way, Whitman hitting a fast clip in the last six minutes of play and going into the lead after the score had been tied four times.

FEATHER TITLE MAY SWITCH IN FIGHT TONIGHT

NEW YORK, Feb. 10. (AP)—Tony Canzoneri of Brooklyn and Benny Bass of Philadelphia are opponents in a 15-round bout at Madison Square Garden tonight for the featherweight championship of the world. Only Seven Major League Pitchers Won Twenty Baseball Games Last Year



Winning 20 or more victories in the majors, with the lively ball now in use and the short fences that surround a number of the parks, continues to be a mighty difficult feat.

In the two major leagues in 1927, just six pitchers were able to reach the 20 or better figure in games won. Four of these pitchers worked in the National, two in the American.

No National League pitcher was able to win more than 20 games. Kremer, Rhem, Donohue and Meadows just reached that mark.

The two American League pitchers to shine were Uble of Cleveland with 27 battles to his credit, and Penneck, who registered 23 triumphs.

Last year the number of twirlers to reach the coveted figure in the majors was increased by one over the preceding season. Once again the National offered four such stars while the American had three.

A striking coincidence about the hurling records of these two years is the fact that not one of the six to go 20 or better games in 1926 was able to repeat last season. Penneck and Meadows fell just one short of the charmed number, while Kremer, out for a couple of months with a bad knee, was two games away.

In the National League averages for 1927, we find Root of Chicago with the most victories,

Hooks and Slides

Numerous reasons and some excuses have been given for the form flop that Jack Sharkey took in his recent fight with Tim Heeney. It was the second chance that Sharkey had been given to fight his way into championship money and he failed twice.

He was stopped last year by Jack Dempsey in the final number of Tex Rickard's elimination tournament and after a rest of six months his progress was stopped again when he could do no better than get a draw with Heeney.

The fact that he was out of the ring for six months and had grown rusty was the principal excuse offered for his poor showing. The body beating that he took from Dempsey and a feeling of caution for a weak left hand were given as other reasons.

It is true that a fighter can't remain idle for six months without suffering a lapse of form. It is true that body beating from a dempsy will not improve a fighter and it is true also that a fighter involuntarily favors a hand that has been broken.

No Ambition Left

It may be that Sharkey got all the bad fighting out of him in that Heeney bout and that he will come back and redeem himself enough to get into one of the two contests that Gene Tunney wants this summer.

But we doubt that Sharkey ever will get to the place that he looked destined for before he met Jack Dempsey.

In the first place Sharkey is not a smart fighter and he is too arrogant to be taught even if he were young enough to be taught. He has glaring faults like a habit of leading with his

right hand and a vain tendency to act bored and allow his mind to wander other places when he is fighting. He showed himself the greenest of rookie fighters when he turned his head toward the referee to utter a squawk and exposed his chin to Dempsey.

That one act of leading with his chin convinced any number of smart boxing men that he never would do against a smart fighter and skilled critics found other minor traits of a non-thinking mechanic in his work.

Secondly, and more important as far as his future is concerned, Sharkey obviously has become satisfied. He hasn't the spark of ambition without which no fighter can succeed to the championship.

Has Plenty Courage

He has plenty of money, enough to buy all of Lithuania, as Dan Morgan says, and it is apparent that he has lost his interest in the business. He also has a surly disposition and is inclined to pout.

He feels that he has not been given a square deal by the sport writers and that Tex Rickard gave him the works last year when he showed Dempsey in ahead of him after he had fought himself into a position of what he considered to be the undisputed challenger.

The sport writers have been very fair to him. Nothing more than what he said and did was printed about him and in fact most of his comments about him and in fact most of his comments about Dempsey and Tunney were censored. His complaint against Rickard also is groundless because Rickard would not have forced him to take the Dempsey fight if he had refused.

After his success against Godfrey, Willis, McTigue and McInerney, it is quite likely that Sharkey felt he could take Dempsey and he would not cut of the big dough instead of one. It is no secret that his managers can't handle him. Jimmy

Johnston, who has a very convincing way of handling fighters, was recruited to get him ready for the Heeney fight, but Johnston couldn't make him mind with threats or prayers. No one could advise him before the Dempsey fight, during the fight or after the fight, and it is not likely that he will change now.

But with all his faults, do not let any one tell you that Jack Sharkey hasn't a heart or lacks courage.

It really isn't hard to dope this out. Most of the professional teams are made up of college stars from all sections of the country. All have had the benefit of the very best coaching possible. In the play of many of the pro teams are combined the best plays of the east, west, south and north.

Without trying to compliment myself, I believe that I have been a better football player as a professional than at any time during my college career. Most players when leaving college have reached a mental and physical stage of perfection that better fits them to carry out the teachings of their famous coaches. In other words they have definitely arrived as they finish their college careers.
