After the weather had cleared a boat was taken out to the ice and "Lady" was found frozen tight in a crevice where she had hidden at the first shot. The dog was chopped from the ice, and rescuers found she had suffered only a mild frostbite in the pads of her hind feet. Upon being freed, "Lady" shook hands with her rescuers.

EXECUTIVES OF TWO STATES TO HOLD MEETING

Governor Patterson and Governor Young Will Join Hands

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 13.—Governor Young of California will meet Governor Patterson of Oregon and his automobile caravan in northern California February 21 and on the next day journey south with them to Sacramento.

With this information, received from A. S. Dudley, secretary of the Sacramento chamber of commerce, the governor's caravan committee of the Portland Chamber planned an itinerary.

The party will leave Portland at 1:30 p. m. Sunday, February 19. Instead of the morning of February 20, as previously planned. It will be at Corvallis at 6 p. m. for dinner and then go on to Eugene to spend the night. An 8 a. m. start from Eugene on Monday will bring it to Roseburg for luncheon, to Medford at 6:30 and to Ashland at 7 o'clock. The party will divide and spend the night in two cities.

A 9 o'clock start from Ashland will get the caravan to Weed, Cal., for lunch at 12:30 and to Redding by 6:15. According to this itinerary, the party will not reach Red Bluff, where Governor Young planned to meet it, February 21. Red Bluff will be reached on Wednesday at 9:35 a. m. Oroville for luncheon at 12:15, and Sacramento at 5:30 o'clock.

Oakland and San Francisco, where headquarters will be established at the Palace hotel, will be reached the following day, Thursday.

Cities outside of Portland and Salem have been asked by Harry H. Haynes, chairman of the committee, to notify him upon how many cars and caravanners they will enter in the parade. The purpose of the caravan, it was explained, will be to thank California for its summer tourist travel to Oregon and to call the world's attention to the fact that the Pacific highway is open the year around.

HAND OF DEATH FALLS HEAVILY ON OLD FAMILY

PORTLAND, Feb. 13. (P)—The hand of death fell heavily during the past few days on the pioneer family of Quackenbush. Edward Quackenbush, 88, prominent in the early history of Portland in business, service and musical circles, died yesterday, following the death of his sister, Miss Louise Quackenbush 85, and his invalid son, Fred, 54. Miss Quackenbush died February 5, on February 4, Fred fell down a stairway striking his head, which resulted in his death Thursday. In the meantime Edward Quackenbush was taken ill of fever, his death ensuing yesterday. The Quackenbush family had lived for years on a farm between Tigard and Tualatin.
