



Gorman Takes Decision from John Carlson

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Feb. 17. (AP)—Joe Gorman, former junior lightweight champion of the Pacific coast, last night showed flashes of his one time ring mastery in winning a decision from Johnny Carlson of Spokane, in a 10-round event. Gorman, carrying the fight in nearly every round, floored Carlson once for the count of nine and several times for lesser counts.

Carlson failed to make his weight but Gorman agreed to go on with him although outweighed 10 pounds. It was a slashing event throughout with Carlson exhibiting furious attacks in an effort to break through to Gorman.

Battle Clyde Orr, of Medford, won from Firpo Jacquette, of Grants Pass in the main preliminary after Firpo had been pushed from the ring and was unable to continue. Lee York won a decision from Dolly Gray in a four round preliminary. Both from Grants Pass.

Fans attended the event from all parts of southern Oregon.

JAKE SCHAEFER BEATS COCHRAN

CHICAGO, Feb. 17. (AP)—Young Jake Schaefer, world's champion 15.2 ballline billiards, wound up an eight game series last night as winner over Welker Cochran, former title holder, 2,727 to 2,185 in a total of 44 innings. Cochran won three of the 400 point blocks and Schaefer five.

In the third block Schaefer ran 400 points, an entire block for the third highest score ever made in a professional match.

MINNEAPOLIS, Feb. 17. (AP)—Three world's indoor records were shattered last night in the central A. A. U. senior championship and open swimming meet held at the Minneapolis athletic club.

Lowell Marsh, 17, of St. Paul, a freshman at the University of Minnesota, set the marks in an exhibition swim against time, in the 440 yards back stroke.

He swam the distance in 6 minutes flat, beating the former mark of 6:02 3-5 held by McGilivray. At 100 yards, his time was 5:21 3-5. The best former time was held by "Stubby" Kruger, also of the Illinois A. C.
