AFTER THE SECOND TUNNEY BATTLE

Wildcat "Ace" Slams Way to Decisive Victory Over Sammy Baker in Ten Torrid Rounds

NEW YORK, Feb. 18. (AP)—Ace Hudkins has outmaneuvered Sammy Baker in the scramble for the role of challenger in the welter weight division.

Through ten rounds of torrid boxing in Madison Square Garden last night, Hudkins bombarded the one time regular army sergeant with a ceaseless two fluted attack to carry off a judge's decision.

Baker dropped to the canvas twice before the furious drives of the Nebraskan, taking counts of nine on each occasion in the second and sixth rounds.

In keeping with his reputation as the wildest of pugilists, Hudkins ripped out with his customary slam-bang tactics without a let-up which frequently drew frenzied reprisals from the outclassed but game Mitchell field boxer.

Hudkins floored his foe in the second round with a terrific right to the jaw and then bored in with rights and lefts to the body and head, giving Baker no quarter. During a savage mixup in the sixth, Baker fell to the resin and protested a foul which was not allowed by the referee although the blow was considered low.

ROUND FIVE—They jumped in a clinch. Ace missed a left to the head and Baker drove short right to the body. Hudkins hooked light left and right to the mouth, and Baker a short left to the body. Sammy jabbed a left to the face, and Ace came back with right to the head. Ace hooked a light left to the face and a right to the body. Baker hooked a left to the face, opening a cut under Ace's left eye. Hudkins forced Sammy into a corner, slamming away with both hands. Baker crossed a hard right to the jaw and followed it up with two light rights to the face. Hudkins forced this fighting and drove Baker to the ropes. Ace landed a hard left hook to the head just before the bell. Round even.

ROUND SIX—Baker drove a straight right to the jaw. They put their heads down and wrestled around the ring and then Baker drove two more rights to the head before the referee broke them. Sammy jabbed his left twice to the face, then hooked two lefts to the face and swung a hard right to Ace's head before Hudkins got going. Ace went after him, head down, driving away with both hands, but Sammy's countering was countering heavily in the soldier's favor. Ace drove a left and a low right to the body and Baker went down for the count of five. Hudkins drove him into a corner, slamming away with both hands. Baker was backing away and practically helpless before his opponent's blows. Just before the bell Sammy crossed a left and right to the face, and Hudkins staggered him with a long left hook to the jaw. Hudkins' round.

ROUND SEVEN—Ace whipped home hard left to the body. Sammy hooked a light left and right to the face, and Hudkins drove him to the ropes with left and right hooks to head. Ace jabbed left to the face four times without return. He had Baker shaking, but Sammy came back with a hard left and right to head. Ace kept a left in Sammy's face, which by this time was a mass of blood. Hudkins looped two over-hand rights to the side of Sammy's head. A left hook sent Sammy through the ropes. Hudkins was forcing the fight, with Baker on the defensive. Hudkins' round.

ROUND EIGHT—Ace jabbed a light left to the face. He swung left and right to Baker's sore mouth as they broke out of a clinch. Sammy hooked two light lefts to the head, and Hudkins a hard right to body. Baker hooked two more lefts to the head at close quarters, then Hudkins crossed a hard right to the face which drove Sammy backwards. Ace got in two more

rights to the face before Baker got away. Baker was fighting back gamely, but Hudkins was the stronger now. Sammy suddenly drove a straight flush to Hudkins' jaw and nearly floored him. Following up his advantage, Baker staggered Hudkins with a series of straight rights. It was the Ace who was hanging on now. Baker's round.

ROUND NINE—Hudkins drove Baker to the ropes without doing any damage. Sammy upped a light right to the face, and Ace hooked a hard left to the mouth. Sammy shook Ace with a left hook to the jaw. Hudkins swung a hard right to the head, and ran into a light right uppercut as he forced his way in. Both were tired and missing badly. They exchanged light lefts to the face, and then Baker caught Hudkins with a short right uppercut to the face. Sammy landed two blows to Ace's one in the first two minutes. Ace jabbed a left to the face and fell into a clinch. Hudkins forced Baker into a neutral corner with lefts to the face, then staggered Baker with two over-hand rights to the head. Round even.

ROUND TEN—They exchanged left jabs to the head. Hudkins hooked a right to the face, and jabbed a left to the jaw. Ace jabbed Sammy again with his left and missed an over-hand right. Baker crossed a right to the face. Hudkins put his head down and forced Sammy into a corner, driving away with both hands. Hudkins jabbed Baker off balance with repeated lefts to the face. Sammy hooked two rights to the head and one to the body. Hudkins hooked a left to the jaw, sending Baker reeling against the ropes. Hudkins' round.

Big Gates Go Also.

It has been pointed out freely and frequently in this column that when Jack Dempsey passed there would go with him the days of million-dollar boxing.

Dempsey, as the champion, drew a million-dollar gate the first time he defended his championship, and his dynamic personality drew almost \$3,000,000 when he made his comeback fight against Gene Tunney in Chicago last year.

Richard has to have one opponent for Tunney this summer, and perhaps two, for the champion wants to make of himself a championship fighter and defend his championship two times or more.

But the New York promoter must find fighters to fight Tunney, and he always had Dempsey at his beck and call until Dempsey, for the reason of his eyes or the forbiddance of Estelle, said he would fight no more.
