## AUTO CRASHES FEWER IN 1927

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 21. (AP)—The number of traffic accidents in Oregon, decreased in 1927 as compared with 1926, the respective totals being 29,188 and 30,025, says the annual report of T. A. Raffety, state traffic inspector. While the number of fatalities increased from 99 in 1926 to 141 in 1927, the higher number is attributed mainly to a more thorough method of checking fatalities. Under the new system serious cases are watched by traffic officers and in event of death after the lapse of some time they are recorded as traffic casualties.
