(Continued from page 1) of the street would be "down in the hole" in event the 40-foot pavement went in.

Can Not Lower Grade.

Councilmen pointed out that the grade could not be lowered because the original strip of paving on Oregon avenue will be utilized in the project and will lower the total paving cost.

"Double stripping would be a sad mistake," declared City Engineer C. C. Kelley. "Oregon avenue is the northern entrance of our city—always will be. As time goes on traffic will be heavier over this thoroughfare. Even now slow and fast traffic coupled with parking, would cause frequent traffic jams on Oregon avenue."

"But," the mayor pointed out, "these are the people who are paying the bill, and their wishes must be considered first."

Councilman Olds wanted to know why 24-foot strips would not be a good compromise.

"Too extravagant," demurred Walker. "Money doesn't grow on apple trees. Perhaps 22 feet, but even then I doubt if it would go through."

The street committee and city engineer, were handed the problem to solve.

Resolutions of intention for the paving of streets in the Commercial, Broad, E.M. district and for the paving of Portland avenue and Pacific Terrace were adopted by the city council.

Following complaint of City School Superintendent J. P. Wells, the city council instructed Street Commissioner Verling to order East Main street residents to replace plank walks which had been removed in a half-dozen instances. Mr. Wells had told the administration that pupils could not use the walk because of the muddy gaps.

"Had Kick Coming."

Residents on Cypress avenue and Rogers street who had informed the council last week that macadamizing on their street was a "farce" and had demanded an investigation, "had a kick coming" in the opinion of Councilman Peltz.

"But that type of improvement is what they asked for," Mayor Waters reminded the council. "It wasn't laid right," Peltz retorted.

Councilman Olds was piqued at the letter from the north Riverside residents.

"I do not consider that a very proper way to take up such a matter with the council," he held.

To Blade Street.

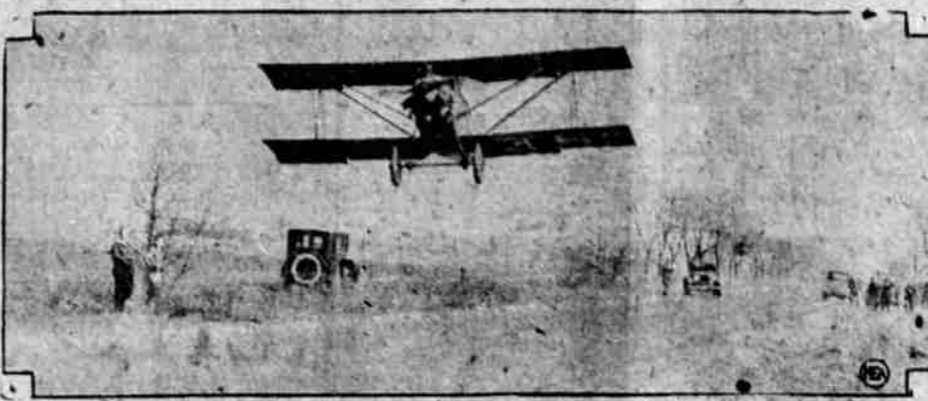
After various and sundry remarks such as the above, the council finally authorized John Verling, street commissioner, to blade the street and put it in as good condition as possible.

## ROSEBURG MAY HAVE AIRPORT

ROSEBURG, Ore., Feb. 21. (A. P.)—The Roseburg city council last night passed an ordinance calling a special election on March 28 on the question of issuing \$25,000 worth of bonds for the establishing of an airport on the 140-acre site at Edenhower selected by Empqua Post, number 18, of the American Legion.

Salient provisions of the ordinance are that the administration of the airport shall be vested in the mayor and four associates to be appointed by him, one to be a member of the council; that a sinking fund shall be created to liquidate the bonds from maturity; that the bonds shall not exceed a tenure of twenty years, and that the rate of interest will be no higher than five percent, payable semi-annually.

Previous to the introduction of the ordinance, petitions bearing the signatures of 730 registered voters and asking for the bond election were presented by a committee of legionnaires. There was also an address by their spokesman, John E. Flurry, who reviews the seven months of quiet and unremittent labor at the local post to get the airport project before the voters.
