



SHADE COASTS TO EASY WIN OVER WEBSTER

DENVER, Colo., Feb. 23. (U. P.)—Dave Shade, California middleweight, coasted to an easy decision over Al Webster of Billings, Mont., in a 10-round bout here last night.

Shade was ahead throughout and took things easily except in the third, seventh and ninth rounds. In those sessions he opened up with a brilliant punching attack that had Webster completely baffled.

Webster's lefts, usually his best blows, were missing constantly during the entire bout.

INTERNATIONAL INDIAN EVENT IS ANNOUNCED

LAWRENCE, Kans., Feb. 23. (UP.)—An international Indian marathon race, with contestants from Canada, Mexico and the United States, will be a feature of the annual Kansas relays, April 21. It was announced today.

Three picked Indian runners from each of the three countries, will travel the 28 mile marathon route between Topeka and Lawrence, Kansas ending in the Kansas Stadium where the relay games will be held.

American Indians for the race will be selected from 210 Indian schools and various reservations, and a selected group will be brought to Lawrence for tryouts.

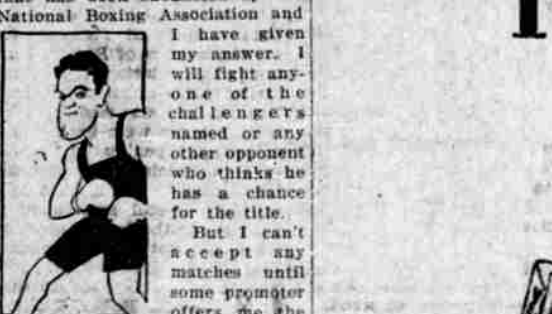
BOSTON ROOKIE WAS END ON CAMP'S ELEVEN

This is not Berry's first big league experience, as he joined the Athletics as a catcher immediately after his college days were over.

If he makes the grade as a regular, he will be the only former All-American grid star playing regularly in the majors.

Have Many Bosses. Now that they have Speaker

to play centerfield for them this season, the Athletics are beginning to assume powerful proportions, much like they did last year.

Remember how the additions of Cobb, Wheat, Holey, Brannom, Collins and others made the A's the favorite among practically all sports writers and critics to win the pennant?

Such a thing this year is not likely. The A's have added Speaker and Bing Miller to their outfield and have brought back Joe Hauser to do their first basing this season.

These three additions should make the Athletics a bit stronger, but not strong enough to warrant any person predicting the strenuously that they will cop the flag in the American League this season.

The Yankees, you might recall, were a good ball club last year.

too good to suit the other clubs and the Pittsburgh Pirates. And they probably will be just as good, if not better this year, as they were last year.
