caused a lot of local support to spring up and he is plainly the favorite down this way. THAT Los Angeles is soon to be one of the largest, if not the largest city in Uncle Sam's domain is quite plain if you will look her over. Never has a section of the nation displayed such marvelous growth in the last eight years, and when growth once starts the momentum has a lot to do with continuing it.

The large industries are heading in and many of them are already here. The city is breaking up into many retail districts, and good ones. In Portland, women drive ten miles to buy a pair of hose at Meter & Frank's while in Los Angeles there is a multitude of Meter & Frank's scattered over the city. It is about the best laid out, the most carefully planned city I have ever seen. Widening of the streets is one of the main issues here and it is staggering to see the money being spent for that purpose.

When I see these streets being widened through congested districts I think of Chris Blanas' plan to widen Main street from Eighth to Twelfth in Klamath Falls and the thought comes to me that Chris is a man of modern ideas and is attempting to do something there for which he will be honored in years to come if he succeeds in the undertaking.

HERE is what one sees in a journey of five blocks in Los Angeles' main retail banking district in the middle of the afternoon. Busses being filled to attend the Indiana and Illinois picnic; a man violinist followed by a woman with an accordion playing for pennies—they walk slowly because the city law states that all such people must keep moving; next is a Barker for a sub-division excursion offering free bull beef sandwiches and hot coffee and a ride to the tract; then you will observe a sixteen thousand dollar Rolls-Royce car driven by a liveried chauffeur pull into the curb—that car contains one of America's royalty, a movie star. Look a little closer and you will observe she is the girl who was born and reared on a dry land homestead out near Wichita, Kansas. She probably did not wear any underclothes until she was sixteen years old, but now she is starring

and is in the big money. Of course her English may be horrid and her grammar may be bum but she has the glad rags and belongs to the royalty.  
Look again, for there is a crowd heavily packed at the corner. A woman has got on too much gin and the police had to call 'Black Maria,' the police wagon, and take her for a ride. And on down the street through the surging crowds one sees faces depicting every station of life. Here is a woman selling pineapple juice to make a living for her children, there is another street musician, the lead pencil boy without legs is ambling along with great difficulty. Sheeks are plentiful and the sleek haired youngsters dart through the crowd with the agility of trout in the Upper Klamath lake.  
And now we come to the blind man exhibiting his sheet of raised letters. He is giving a demonstration of how the blind can read. He smiles and seems happy, for occasionally he stops and repeats, "For God so loved the world He gave his only begotten son so that all who believe in Him shall not perish but have everlasting life."

AS I LOOKED at that great mixture, saw the scramble of humanity in its surging back and forth the thought came that probably the old blind man is the happiest of them all.

BRIEFLY stated Los Angeles and Southern California constitute one hell-roaring big playground, the like of which the world has never known, and coupled with her playground now comes the industrial life, the heavy agricultural production, the oil revenues and the international shipping.

Yes, she is to be one of the biggest, if not the biggest, city in America.
