

LAKEVIEW MAY BE MEMBER OF BASIN LEAGUE

Lake County Town Might Join Klamath Circuit

LAKEVIEW, March 5.—According to unofficial advice received here from Klamath Falls, Lakeview would be welcomed into the timber league which has been playing a good brand of baseball in Klamath county for the past several years.

It will be more than a month before the league is organized for the coming season, but those interested in the project in Klamath Falls have sent word that if Lakeview should desire to enter a team in the league, it undoubtedly would be accommodated and would thus create still greater interest in strictly amateur baseball.

Lumbermen Interested
Officials of the Pelican Bay Lumber company take a leading part in promoting the timber league, and Lakeview baseball enthusiasts were advised to get in touch with these officials if a decision to put a baseball team in the field.

Among the younger element of Lakeview there is much interest in the situation since the announcement in The Examiner last week that a club might be organized here for entry into this league.

Plenty of Time
As soon as spring weather breaks here it is likely that baseball fever will begin to mount and a definite decision will be made concerning the formation of a club here and an effort to enter the league.

The Timber League operates under a regular schedule and is well organized in every way. Most of the players are employed in the lumber industry in Klamath county and great interest is aroused at the several mills and towns where the competing teams are located.

Has Courage of His Convictions

John McGraw Keeps in Headlines by the Many Unusual Trades He Makes

You just can't keep John McGraw out of the headlines of the sports pages.

Whether you are an ardent supporter of John McGraw or a confirmed enemy of his methods, there is no denying that he has the courage of his convictions.

To my way of thinking, John McGraw is outstanding in baseball, first as a player, then as a manager. I do not always agree with his policies, I often question his judgment on certain things, but after all is said and done, the leader of the Giants is unique and original in his methods. He gets results and that is what counts.

Whether you agree with McGraw or not, you must have the greatest admiration for one who is willing to make trades which, on the surface, seem poor deals, yet often work to his advantage. If every man had the courage of his convictions, McGraw is such a person.

Since the first of the year, the New York club has made two deals which have started the baseball world. The first was the trading of Rogers Hornsby, greatest of present-day second basemen, to Boston, for Catcher Hogan and Outfielder Welsh of Boston.

A cold analysis of the deal makes it seem that New York got all the worst of the transaction. Hogan is a catcher of great promise and Welsh is a good outfielder, but by no line of reasoning can the trade be considered even-up.

Yet, knowing John McGraw as I do, I am positive he has one or more definite reasons for making such a deal. Possibly they never will be revealed but I would be willing to wager my last cent that if McGraw cared to talk he might offer some fairly logical reasons for his actions.

As everyone knows, for six years John McGraw has openly said he would like nothing better than to add Rogers Hornsby to

the Giants. Several years ago he made an offer of \$250,000 in real money. It was turned down. Then two years ago an incident developed in the ranks of the Giants that made it possible for McGraw to realize his desire of many years, obtaining Hornsby.

During an important series at St. Louis in the 1926 pennant race, John McGraw took to task the star of his team, Frankie Frisch, for poor play. Frisch resented the criticism and took the first train for home after the argument. McGraw regarded this as an unpardonable sin. He formed the opinion that Frisch had quit on him in the pinch. McGraw then traded him to St. Louis for Hornsby.

Now, after one year with the Giants, McGraw has sent away the man he sought for years to Boston in what appears to be a very uneven trade. However, you can gamble there is a reason, maybe several. Since I regard Hornsby as a marvel, I can't agree with McGraw's judgment in this particular deal. But that is neither here nor there.

Shortly after this surprising deal, McGraw followed it with another almost as startling. He traded Burleigh Grimes, the winner of 19 games for the Giants last season, even up, for Vic Aldridge of Pittsburgh, who could win only 15 games for the pennant-winning Pirates. As he had Hornsby, McGraw for years had sought Grimes. Getting both stars the same season, he cuts loose from them after one campaign.

Once again, I would say McGraw has his reasons for this trade if he cared to divulge them. McGraw doesn't like spitball pitchers as a rule. He is strong for the curve ball artists. Grimes is a splitter, Aldridge a curver.

It isn't the first time McGraw has pulled the unusual. He once traded Heinie Groh, only to later take him back. His record is

full of the unusual and yet his career has been highly successful. It would perhaps be best to wait until the close of the season to pass final judgment on McGraw's two sensational deals of 1928.

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SCHEISEL BUYS GUERNSEY HERD

Prominent Klamath Dairyman Improves Standard of Dairying

A herd of some of the finest cattle in the northwest has been purchased by Emil Scheisel well known rancher of the Henley district, and will arrive here from Portland the latter part of this week.

The herd includes 38 head of Ayrshires and 16 head of Guernseys. The Ayrshires are all purebred and registered, and the Guernseys are a choice herd of graded stock. The foundation of the Ayrshire stock from this herd originated in eastern Canada and blood lines in the herd hold practically all world records for milk and butter fat in this breed.

Herd sire which Scheisel is purchasing is half-brother to the world's record junior four year old heifer which is owned by the Oregon Agricultural college. This herd has been shown at all northwestern fairs including the Pacific International and has been prominent in winning.

Curtis Martin of Portland, a representative of the Portland Livestock company stated that he believes this is the finest herd of cattle ever shipped into the county. The milk from Ayrshire cows is rated as the health-

lost milk in the world next to goat's milk, and government statisticians from the agricultural department show it to be most free from disease.

Scheisel stated that he would be glad to have visitors visit his ranch and view the cattle. His home is located at the first ranch north of Henley school.
