



KLAMATH HIGH TITLE WINNER; DEFEATS MALIN

Game Fast and Furious; Score Tied on Several Occasions

The Klamath county high school basketball team clinched the county championship last night by defeating the Malin high school on their own floor, 29 to 19. The game was fast and close throughout, the teams being tied several times.

The game was of championship calibre, for both teams were going at top speed. Both played a fast breaking and passing offense. The guarding was unusually close in the first half and not many shots were made. Klamath high seemed confused by the low ceiling and was unable to chalk up many counters. The game saw-sawed back and forth, ending in an 8 to 3 tie at the end of the first half.

The second half was marked by spectacular shooting and guarding. Malin gained and held a two-point lead until 10 seconds before the final whistle when Roy Huntley knotted the count by a beautiful shot which necessitated a fine minute overtime period.

The Klamath high team entered the overtime period with a rush and for the first time in the game seemed to find their real stride, while Malin quickly went on the defensive. Charlie Kendall started the lead with an overhead shot, which was quickly followed by four more baskets until Klamath high had garnered ten points in the five minutes, the game ending 29 to 19 in their favor.

The fine performance of Charlie Kendall and Roy Huntley featured for Klamath, Charlie being high point man of the contest with 15 markers. Huntley played a mighty good game at guard. Captain Mikosky played stellar ball for Malin, and was high man for their five with 10 points.

Captain Orrell played nice ball and led the Klamath team like a veteran. The break of the game was when Orrell took time out just before the final whistle. His team came back with the "old zipper" and turned what seemed defeat into victory.

Howard Pruitt played a mighty good game at center, getting his share of tip-offs from his taller opponent. He looks the best in the pivot position and did himself proud last night. Harold Olson played a bang-up game at forward. His passing and guarding featured the contest and was a big factor in Klamath's victory.

The Klamath high girls' team met to the Malin girls by a 25 to 23 score. The Klamath team put up a good fight, but the superior of the Malin girls won the game for them.

If any one eastern institution of learning has held the athletic glare this collegiate year, it is Pittsburgh. Pitt had a most successful season in football. Its basketball team today ranks the outstanding one in the east.

The Pitt grid squad, as it is easy to remember, was the only major eleven in the east to finish its regular schedule undefeated. Jack Sutherland's boys were held to a scoreless tie by the Washington and Jefferson eleven.

The Panthers claimed eastern and national titles for their season of play, but this claim did not meet with the response necessary to receive such titles without argument. Yale was favored equally for the eastern title by many.

Their national claim skidded a bit when they lost to Stanford in the annual Tournament of Roses game at Pasadena. This loss was by a lone point margin.

Nevertheless, Jack Sutherland had a great team and it played sensationally during the season. Its outstanding performer was Gibby Welch, captain, who was chosen practically unanimously as an all-America back.

Have Great Cage Team.

Perhaps the Pittsburgh basketball team will suffer defeat once before they hang their tops up for the season. Perhaps twice. But after escaping Notre Dame's gallant fight the other night, it is doubtful.

When the Panthers met the Irish a few nights ago, they had won thirteen straight games. They were the favorites to win by at least ten points.

To be sure, they won, but by the margin of only two points and in the last twenty seconds of play. It was a tough battle, and one that seemed about to be recorded a loss for the Panthers.

Pitt has defeated some of the more important Big Ten teams and several of the leading eastern teams. The team has averaged close to fifty points a game. And with that one tight battle against Notre Dame out of its system, Pitt should carry on as they did in earlier games.

This will be the second of a three game series to decide the championship of the entire league. The Pelicans defeated the southern team Thursday night 74-28 at Pelican Bay.

Should Merrill win tonight, a third game will be played early next week on a neutral floor, which will be decided by the flip of a coin. If Merrill wins the flip the game will be played at Heeney, and if Pelican Bay wins the toss it will be played on the local Legion floor.

J. FROST WINS RIFLE TOURNEY

Entrance of another major distributing agency into this city was announced yesterday by officials of the California Petroleum company, who stated that concern will be ready to operate here shortly after May 1.

Site for a sub-station of Calpet has been selected in the Altamont section and construction of a spur track to service the plant is to be commenced in the near future, it was stated.

seven miles through the farming section west of the highway. \$25,000 Available.

According to the bond issue, \$25,000 has been provided for the new road. The project will be graded and surfaced. It will open up permanently a large arid section during winter and early spring that would otherwise be impassable insofar as automobiles are concerned.

Still another important bond road is the authorized three and one-half mile Short-Young county thoroughfare, a road which is located in the Heeney district and which would open up certain section during the entire year. The bond issue authorizes expenditure of \$15,000 on this project.

A third road which will be undertaken will be the Ochoco-Wilson highway, a stretch of road approximately one mile long which will be graded and surfaced at a cost of \$1,000.

"Need Rights of Way."

Rights of way are the only impediment holding up the projects, Mr. Henry explained.

"Inability to secure rights of ways this winter is another testimonial to the need of roads," said Mr. Henry. "In sections we wanted to visit, the roads were often in such bad shape it was impossible to visit the land holders through whose property we desired to route these various road surveys."

Contracts have been let for the surfacing of the Klamath Falls-Weed highway from Midland to Calist, at the state line; for the surfacing of slightly over one mile of the Yonah Valley market road from the point where the new Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway surfaces north to Hildebrand; for surfacing of ten miles of the Klamath Falls-Northwest road (Fremont road) from Klamath Falls west to the west boundary of the Langell Valley market road.

senior platform, which extends back about 200 feet.

In the other wing of the station provision is made for ticket and telegraph offices, and the offices for superintendent, dispatchers, and freight and express departments. The freight house, 35x130 feet, extends back from this section of the depot, with the freight tracks on the inside, paralleling the passenger tracks. The delivery and receiving platform is on the opposite side. The rear freight section will be completed by May 1, it is expected.

Plans provide a heated room for the storing of perishable products. The building will be heated by a steam oil-burning boiler.

The new station will front on South Sixth Street, one of the main business arteries of Klamath Falls. It is conveniently located within a short distance from the business center of the city.

Independent Extension

The Great Northern, through construction of 46 miles of new railway, purchase of existing track, and negotiations of joint trackage agreements with the Southern Pacific, Oregon Trunk, and Spokane, Portland and Seattle railways is extending its independent operations from Portland and Spokane to Klamath Falls, affording the southern Oregon city a direct rail outlet to the east, via Spokane. The new line east will bring the timber and agricultural resources of that section of Oregon nearer the Chicago markets, as well as

Half Interest in Straborn

The Great Northern has also acquired a half interest in the Straborn road, which extends forty miles northeast of Klamath Falls into the forest area.

Preparations are being made by Klamath Falls and Bend to stage a celebration about May 15 to fittingly observe the opening of the new extension.

Klamath Falls is already assured one large industry as the result of the new rail development. The Weyerhaeuser flume interests are completing arrangements for construction of a large mill at Klamath Falls this year. They will also build some thirty miles of logging railway.

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
