



PAGE TOO HARD FOR SCORES OF PYLE RUNNERS

Troupe of Marathon Prize Aspirants Dwindles Each Day

By Russell J. Newland (Associated Press Sports Writer) KINGMAN, Ariz., Mar. 14. (A.P.)—A slowly dwindling field of somewhat more than 100 marathon speedsters today donned their various running paraphernalia preparatory to pushing their slowly tiring bodies over the eleventh lap of the 2,400 miles Los Angeles to New York foot race.

Peach Springs, only a valley land speck on the vast expanse of Arizona was today's destination of the runners crossing the continent in quest of a \$25,000 first prize on part of the total \$48,500 to be distributed among the first ten.

With the Black mountains behind them, the runners turned into the Wallapai valley, a 28-mile stretch, thence over rolling country to Peach Springs 52 miles from Kingman. Owing to the long lap a six o'clock starting time was decided on. When the contestants began their hike today Arthur Newton, Rhodesia, South Africa, was in first place in elapsed time with 53:35:00 for the total 345.7 miles from Los Angeles to Kingman. Newton, 44-year-old holder of the 100-mile running title of England, sped to victory in yesterday's 28.7 mile lap from Oatman to Kingman.

POPULATION OF U. S. EXCEEDS 120 MILLIONS

WASHINGTON, March 14. (A.P.)—A provisional estimate by the census bureau today placed the population of the United States as of July, 1928, at 120,015,000, an increase of four per cent over the 115,716,620 actual count on January 1, 1920. The next federal census will not be taken before 1930. The table gives Oregon an estimated population July 1, 1928, of 992,000, as against the census figures of January 1, 1920, of 783,394.

Popular Portland Lightweight Bewilders Bay City Fighter

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 14. (A.P.)—Joe Marcus, Portland lightweight, had Tommy Cello, San Francisco, baffled and bewildered in their 10-round main event last night, and took the decision. Marcus' leading two-fisted attack was effective and he slowly wore the Californian down. Cello showed at his best in the third when he poured in a volley of thunderous left and right hooks to the stomach. Marcus was credited with seven rounds. Teddy Fox, Salem, furnished the thrill of the evening when he knocked out Young Villa, Jr. the second of what was to have been a six round featherweight go. Fox dropped the Filipino twice in the first round for short counts with right hooks to the chin. Billy Watson won a four round decision from Earl Stultz in the curtain raiser. George Hval and Jimmy Wilde drew four rounds. Tommy O'Connell and Tommy Seaman, drew six rounds.
