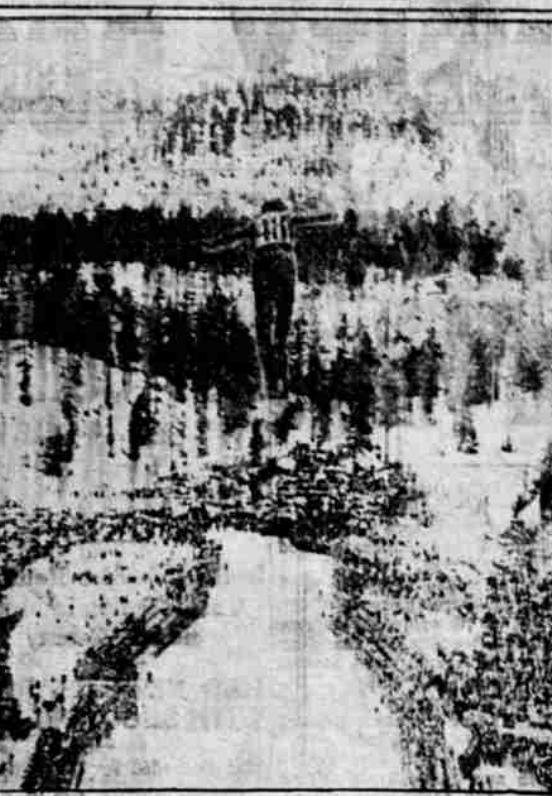

With Hart out of the race, Arthur Newton, the 44 year old British runner entered from Rhodesia, South Africa, became the oldest of the race.

At the start of today's lap Newton led the field by more than seven hours in total elapsed time taken to cover the 435.7 miles from Los Angeles. It has taken him 67 hours, 10 minutes and 30 seconds.

Newton finished second to Andrew Payne, sturdy limbed Claremont, Okla., youth in yesterday's leg. Payne's time for the 38.3 mile stretch was 5:39:10 while Newton's was 5:47:30.
