



KLAMATH CLUB SCORES 74 IN OREGON SHOOT

Only One Miss Prevents Perfect Score; Stand Fifth in Field of 28

Only one miss prevented the Klamath Gun club scoring perfect for the Oregonian Telegraph shoot yesterday. The scatter gun artists of Klamath scored 74 out of a possible 75.

Not counting yesterday's scores Klamath stands fifth in a field of 28 clubs. A record for the number of perfect scores marked up in a single day was registered when nine clubs reported perfect marks of 75 for their three high men, while seven clubs missed getting their perfect by dropping just one bird. The nine clubs that went straight were Arlington, La Grande, Halsey, Echo, Heppner, Bandon, Yamhill, Coquille and Huntington. Washington county, Klamath, Bend, Roseburg, Salem, Monitor and Pendleton missed out by just one bird. There also were a number of 73 and 72 counts turned in.

Naturalist to Observe Bird Life in Basin

To attempt to solve one of the mysteries of nature: Namely, the nesting habits of the Oregon Jay, commonly known as the Camp Robber, J. C. Braley, who is a naturalist by hobby but the distributor of Franklin cars for the state of Oregon by business, is expected to arrive in Klamath Falls March 28.

Although the Oregon Jay is comparatively plentiful in the Klamath country, practically no person has found out where he nests. One nest was discovered near Crescent, but so far as District Game Warden Marion J. Barnes knows, that is the only nest that was found.

It is assumed that the Oregon Jay leaves his usual haunts in the green pine forests and seeks the high crags and peaks to nest. Mr. Braley is particularly interested in egg collecting and his trip to Klamath is, to not only observe the habits of the strange bird, but to obtain several egg specimens.

Preparations Being Made to Open Diamond Lake Hatchery

To prepare for the "greatest trout run in the world," from the greatest "fish hole in the world," Lloyd Tucker and three assistants left Saturday for Diamond lake. Tucker is superintendent of the Diamond lake egg taking station and hatchery.

The four men were taken to a point within 14 miles of the lake by District Game Warden Marion J. Barnes. From that point they hiked into the lake over the snow.

"There's just about one-half as much snow this year as last," said Mr. Barnes.

The run of spawning trout should start within the next 20 days. Diamond lake—a few short years a body of water without a fish in it—has developed into the greatest trout egg taking station in the world. From 12-15,000,000 to 18,000,000 trout eggs are taken from the beautiful lake each year.

Because there is not much snow the road will be open into the lake earlier this year than last; however, fishing will not commence until June.

'Cat' Fishermen Out Yesterday On Lost River

In the first concerted onslaught on the army of "cats" this year, scores of Klamath anglers with fishing pole in one hand and can of worms in the other, advanced upon Lost river yesterday and extracted therefrom innumerable of the slow moving but delectable cat fish.

From Wilson bridge, in the lower reaches of the river, to Harpold dam in its upper reaches, fishing parties dotted the banks of the streams dipping their lures into the slow moving green waters and occasionally hauling forth a wiggling, ugly cat fish.

The "cats" were on the bottom, of course, and anglers were forced to sink their bait to a point just a few inches above the bottom.

Although trout season is opened in Ewanna Lake, Link River and upper Klamath Lake the year around, fishing for trout has been comparatively poor.

Tarzan, the wonder horse, can now qualify as a full fledged circus performer, according to Ken Maynard, his boss and owner.

Tarzan, known as one of the most intelligent horses on the screen, appears with Maynard in the latter's latest western feature "The Wagon Show," a story of a circus in the early day west, at the Liberty Theatre today.
