Klamath Lake Game Reserve Meets Setback

Opposed to throwing the entire marsh at the head of Upper Klamath Lake into a bird reserve the Klamath Sportsmen's association Monday night named a committee to meet with H. D. Newell, reclamation head, to obtain a clear conception of the government's plan for the proposed reserve.

The committee comprises Dr. Wright, "Cap" Reed and Marion Barnes, together with the association directors, O. D. Mathews, Dr. Boyd, and Vance Hutchens, and their session is scheduled for this week.

The association favors the bird reserve proposal only on grounds that the government make part of the marshland a public shooting area. Under previously advanced plans, the government proposed throwing the entire section into a reserve.
