



SAILOR WOODS AND H. BURKE CLASH TONIGHT

Wrestling Tournament for Coast Championship Opens in Klamath

The bigtime wrestling tournament to be conducted here during the next few months under the skillful eye of Promoter A. McDuffee, gets underway at Scandia hall at 8:30 tonight when Sailor Jack Woods of Medford grapples with Henry Burke, Pelican City in the main event bout.

The main attraction is the first of a series of elimination bouts staged by McDuffee with a view to settling the light heavyweight championship of the Pacific coast. The promoter, who recently came to Klamath Falls from Oakland, California, to build up the sporting game in this city, has full authority to confer a title now widely disputed.

"I don't care who wins these bouts," the promoter who is sincerely trying to offer a good mat show here, said last night. "I'm here to show the fans they can see top notch stuff in Klamath Falls, and I aim to bring it to them. In the final bout of this tournament, a winner will get the light heavyweight belt. The next man here will be Bull Montana and I don't care whether Burke or Woods meets him. These bouts are honest. I can't afford to have 'em otherwise."

Woods is a grappler who has fast built up a reputation along the coast and considers himself in line for the coast belt. Burke claims a title but will have to do some hard wrestling to keep it or win any other in the bout tonight. In McDuffee's opinion, each is anxious to stay in the tournament as long as possible, so fans expect the best mat exhibition ever staged in this city, tonight.

In the semi Floyd Way of Bonanza will go with Lefty Chellis, city, the second time these 155-pounders have traded scissors. Roy Little and Richard Clauson, 125-pounders, will do the curtain raiser in the first of a series of bouts for the local newsboy's title.

Way and Chellis are starting off the series for the county title.

Ticket sale indicates the fan crowd will fill Scandia tonight, making that scene of many sport encounters the center of sport interest for the first time in many months.

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 21. (A. P.)—Clete Kauffman, Columbus, Ohio, crab hold expert, defeated Al Karasick, Portland, in their light heavyweight wrestling bout here last night. Kauffman won the first fall in 31 minutes, 22 seconds, with a Japanese wristlock. Karasick took the second in 8 minutes, 32 seconds, with a series of flying headlocks. Kauffman took the third fall in less than a minute with a double step over toe grip while Karasick's neck was resting on the ropes. Karasick declared the rope had cut off his wind and his wild waving was in an effort to call the referee's attention to the fact he was being strangled. It was the first match Karasick has lost here since his return from Australia.
