

HEAVY RAIN IN BASIN LESSENS

overflowed and created not only a nuisance but damage to property, in some instances.

The Green Lantern cafeteria in the basement of the Melrose building building was virtually a swimming pool; water poured into the basement of the Arcade and Willard hotels. Other basement establishments in the business district were similarly discommoded.

Mills addition resembled a lake some places; water poured off the hills of Klamath in a steady stream and found its way into basements in many instances; several streams tumbled down the hills in the South Riverside district resembling miniature waterfalls; mill activity was severely impeded in many instances; the Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway in the Dairy district and Beatty district was inundated in several sections, but no serious damage occurred; all dirt streets of Klamath Falls and dirt roads of rural districts were transformed into impassable mire but macadamized thoroughfares held up well under the test.

"They say it rained about three inches in the last six days, but so far as I am concerned it rained 20," dolefully commented John Uerling, street commissioner, this morning. "We had a bad time with our sewers. At Ninth and High streets it was a lake; in Mills addition it was a duck

pond; every trunk line and storm sewer overflowed."

Early this morning a turn to the cold accompanied by a light sleet revealed that the rain storm, temporarily at least, had come to an end.

Approximately three inches of rainfall has been recorded at the Southern Pacific weather bureau since last Wednesday.

Telephone wires heavily laden with snow which later turned into a steady downpour of rain put more than 75 telephones in Klamath Falls out of order Sunday evening in the districts where wires and poles were damaged.

Toll line trouble between Klamath Falls and Medford caused by the snow laden wires put service out between the two towns Sunday. This service was restored this morning.

The rural line between Klamath Falls and Oleno was also down. Yesterday afternoon trouble men were working on this line putting it back into service.

Not for many years has the Klamath Falls exchange witnessed a rainstorm as heavy as that of last night and today.

Many power lines of the California-Oregon Power company were down at various times Saturday, Sunday and Monday.

BUSINESS OVER NATION GAINS

General Tendency Away From Presidential Year Bugaboo Noted

NEW YORK, March 27. (AP)—The New York World which has made a survey of business conditions optimistically reports today as follows:

"Business in the United States is on the upgrade, with unemployment on the decrease.

"More than that, business bids fair to escape much of the halting uncertainty that usually has characterized presidential election years.

"To this survey leaders in industry, labor leaders, bankers and national distributors have contributed as have the leading statistical services. Much also has come from government agencies.

"The survey does not show that business is improving in all lines—bituminous and textiles, where special conditions govern, being outstanding exceptions—but generally speaking the reports show improved prospects reported in the great majority of lines.

"The outstanding factors are improvement in the building, steel and automobile industries.

"Improvement is also noted in agriculture, especially in the stock raising branch, which is declared to have emerged from the severe depression that marked the collapse of the post-war boom."

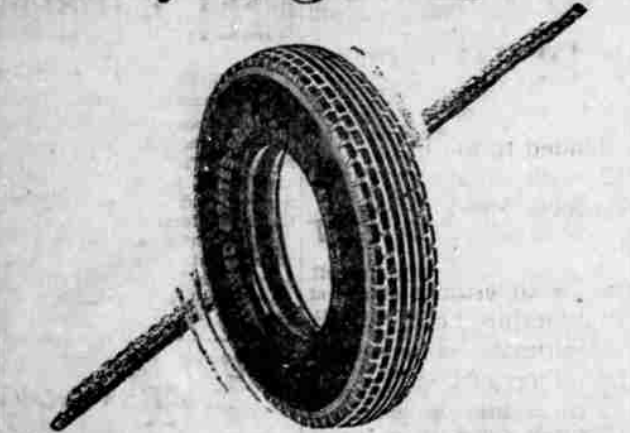
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Suspected Hit And Run Auto Driver Caught

The offending car was discovered parked on a local street late Sunday by Louis Mueller, deputy, after he and L. O. Shirley, prohibition officer had earlier driven northward in search of the machine, following a telephone call here advising officers of the accident.
