BEST QUINTETS IN NATION TO ENTER TOURNEY

Washington High School Leaves Today for Chicago, Ill.

CHICAGO, March 29. (AP)—Forty of the country's best basketball teams, survivors of some 2,000 that started the season, will be in the tenth annual University of Chicago national interscholastic basketball tournament starting next Tuesday and continuing until Saturday night. Morton high school of Cicero, Ill., won the title last year. Thirty-five teams, representing 31 states, are already entered. Thirty are state champions, three are runners up and two hold local title.

Two of the most interesting teams are the United States Indian school of Albuquerque, winners of the New Mexico tournament and Carr Creek, Kentucky. Four Indian tribes are represented on the Albuquerque quintet. Carr Creek lost the Kentucky championship to Ashland, also in the tournament in a game that went four overtime periods. The team is composed of typical mountaineers, who came to the state meet at Lexington unknown and so won the people of that city that Lexington is paying their expenses. Without a symposium, the Carr Creek boys practice out of doors, wearing overalls for gym suits.

PORTLAND, March 29. (AP)—Washington high basketball team of Portland, winners in the Oregon state tournament, will leave today for Chicago to participate in the national interscholastic basketball championship tournament there April 3 to 7.

Hooks and Slides

One of the most attractive of the engineering traits of Knute Rockne is his daring frankness. Through the many recent attacks against football the Notre Dame coach maintained that the game was not in need of defense and he has consistently exploded many arguments presented for the game.

"The football coach is supposed to teach boys how to play football. Their moral education is for the Sunday schools," he said recently. "When I tell boys they shouldn't smoke I am not trying to improve their morals. I want them to have good wind on the field."

Since several prominent eastern coaches have said that they felt it was a high obligation of their profession to make good citizens and good men out of the football players, Rockne's remarks might be interpreted as a slap at those moralists. But anyone who knows Rockne knows that he was merely stating a private opinion when he said that.

Rockne's teams always have been well behaved on and off the field, and if they weren't given actual lessons in proper moral conduct by their coach they knew without being told what would happen to them if they didn't behave.

"It's fine to listen to sermons about sportsmanship and that victory is of secondary importance, but every football coach knows that he is being retained for the purpose of developing winning teams. There are enough actual rules in the football code to cover the moral angle," Rockne once said.

The emphasis he placed upon the code of morals and sportsmanship was one of the chief arguments made against a coach of a big western conference university this winter.

Some of the old grads, who were emphatic in demanding his resignation, said they visited the locker room between halves of one of the most important games of the season. The team was a touchdown behind and had played such sloppy football in the first half that they expected to hear the coach give the boys a good old-fashioned calling down.

"But what did he do?" they roared. "Why he went to the blackboard, called the attention of the squad and wrote on it—'Fight. Fight. Fight. BUT BE GENTLE!' And the boys went out and were as gentle as they could be."

U. S. MAY NOT CONTRIBUTE TO CANAL TUNNEL

Because the present canal is adequately serving the needs of the U. S. reclamation service, the government probably will not aid in financing the proposed tunneling of the big ditch which runs through the heart of the city, Herbert D. Newell, Klamath superintendent for the U. S. R. S., told the Klamath Falls Engineers' society Wednesday evening.

The engineers, meeting in regular session at Linkhaven, devoted the evening to discussion of the proposal to send the irrigation water from the upper lake through a tunnel in lieu of the existing open canal. C. C. Kelly, city engineer, led in the discussion, repeating for the engineers' information which he laid before the city park board Tuesday night, to the effect that the project would cost about \$160,000.
