REPORT GIVES STAND OF S. P. ON LINE SOUTH

What is its stand regarding the construction of the Modoc Northern railroad from Klamath Falls south to Alturas was outlined in a general way by the Southern Pacific railroad in its annual report filed by Henry DeForest, chairman of the board of directors and William Sproule, president of the company.

The report reviews the circumstances leading to the entrance of the Great Northern railway into the Klamath basin, and the arrangement by which Southern Pacific and the Great Northern each acquire a one-half interest in the Oregon-California and Eastern railway, extending out of Klamath Falls. The report states that construction of the line extending from Klamath Falls, through Cornwell, Calif., to a connection with the Nevada-California-Oregon railway near Alturas, Calif., was commenced within the time prescribed in the order of the Interstate Commerce commission of May 3, 1927 by grading several miles of road bed.

"The construction of this line has not been continued, however," says the report, "pending review of the changed circumstances brought about by the entry of the Great Northern into Klamath basin."
