

ARNE SUOMINEN RETAINS LEAD IN CROSS COUNTRY MARATHON

MORIARTY, N. W., Mar. 30. (AP)—Maintaining his spectacular running, Arne Suominen, Detroit, continued to lead in elapsed time in the cross country marathon. From Seven Springs to Moriarty, a distance of 29.5 miles Suominen averaged better than 7 miles an hour. The Finn's elapsed time for the 92.5 miles travelled so far is 154:22:05.

Suominen now has a lead of three hours, 48 minutes and 21 seconds over Peter Gavuzzi, Southampton, England, still holding second berth with elapsed time of 158:20:14.

Today the runners expected to move eastward across the rolling New Mexico prairie toward Pampa, their 27th control, 35 miles away.

Nestor Erickson of Port Chester, N. Y., and August Fogar of Ashtabula, Ohio, dropped out of the Los Angeles to New York marathon race today as a protest against the dismissal of their trainer and countryman, Alex Finn, who was ordered to leave the cross country caravan for an infraction of the rules. Those in charge of the derby said Finn was dismissed for berating Referee Arthur Daffey of Boston.

While Babe Ruth is not a serious rival of Bobby Jones or likely to annex the British or American golf championship this summer, he is nevertheless a very good golfer.

Playing with him for seven straight days over almost as many different courses this spring, I had the opportunity to watch him play over 16 rounds of 18 holes under varying conditions.

He shot an even 100 for his first round the first day. His next round was 93. From then on he never was out of the low 90's and had one round of 76, the card of which I have reproduced in my cartoon. The mysterious "Gene" on the card is not, however, the heavyweight champ, but a well known Chicago newspaper man, "Gene" Conley.

Ruth's 16 rounds, varying from 100 the first round to his 76 on the 15th round averaged slightly less than 83.

'WOMAN' CHAMP TURNS OUT TO BE MERE MAN

Death Reveals a Secret Kept From World for Years

SAPULPA, Okla., Mar. 30. (A. P.)—Death has revealed that Frances Anderson, known for many years as "champion woman billiard player," in reality was a man.

Anderson ended his own life here yesterday by slashing his throat and wrists with a razor. Not until the body was prepared for burial did the secret of 30 years of masquerading become known. Crumpled in one of the woman's stockings he wore, was a letter indicating he had contemplated death and carrying a plea that his secret might be preserved.

"Do what you want with my body," the letter said, "but don't let the world know my secret."

Other than the information obtained from the clippings, authorities were unable to learn much about Anderson. He apparently had spent considerable time in Los Angeles. He was about 60 years old.

SEKYRA WILL HAVE WEIGHT ADVANTAGE

NEW YORK, March 30. SEKYRA PRIMED FOR TEN ROUND CLASH TONIGHT

Odds 8 to 5 in Favor of Leo Lomski, "Aberdeen Assassin"

NEW YORK, Mar. 30. (AP)—Ten rounds and Leo Lomski, the "Aberdeen assassin" stand between Joe Sekyra, 21-year-old Dayton, Ohio, light heavyweight, and a chance for a world's title championship.

Sekyra, who has fought himself into prominence during a ring career of little more than a year, meets the rugged hard hitting Lomski over the ten round route at Madison Square Garden tonight.

Tommy Loughran, king of the light heavyweights has agreed to defend his crown against the winner.

The odds were 8 to 5 that Lomski's experience would be too great an obstacle for the youthful Sekyra to surmount. There were fears, too, in the Dayton boy's camp that making 175 pounds, the class limit, would rob Sekyra of some strength that might come in handy when Lomski's right hand plays a tattoo on his body. Sekyra rapidly is growing out of the light heavyweight division. Many of his best performances have been against heavyweights.

Lomski, at 24, has 75 battles to look back upon, one of them a defeat at the hands of Loughran early this year. In that bout, Lomski swung that deadly right hand to the champion's chin and Tommy went down twice in the first round for counts of nine.

But Lomski could not keep Loughran down and the champion boxed his way to victory the rest of the way.

Physically, Sekyra will have a decided advantage, as he is taller, heavier and bigger in every way than the Pacific coast slugger.

"Hit-Run" Auto Hits Man Near Canal Bridge

Struck down by a hit and run driver, a woman, driving a light car, who sped on at a high rate of speed, Carl Sandell of the California-Oregon Power company was severely bruised on Wednesday while en route to his work. It was learned today.

The accident occurred on North Eleventh street just across the Lincoln street bridge. After striking Sandell with the fender of the car, the blow throwing him to the pavement, the woman, whom Sandell did not recognize failed to stop to assist him, but instead stepped on the gas and hurried in the opposite direction.

Sandell was able to resume his work although stiff and sore from the bruises.

This is the third "hit and run" accident reported in three weeks.

Mrs. James Hill is recovering from injuries which she suffered when struck down by a hit and run driver on south Sixth street. It is expected she will be able to return to the family residence on Eberlein street from the Klamath Valley hospital, where she is recuperating, within the next few days.

W. E. Patterson of the Rex Arms and Miss Gladys Gardner have recovered from injuries which they suffered two weeks ago at Altamont when they were struck to the pavement by a large car, which failed to stop, but instead sped towards the Dallas-California highway.

Washington Hi Is Ineligible

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 30. (A. P.)—Members of the Washington high baseball team, champions of Oregon, who started for Chicago yesterday to participate in the national tournament to be held in that city were halted by telegraph at Arlington and instructed to return home. It developed the team was ineligible to play in the tournament due to the fact the Washington high school, as well as other Portland high schools, never affiliated with the Oregon high school athletic association. Money raised to defray expense of the trip will be returned to its donors.
