

Pacific Coast League 1928 Season Opens Today

8 CLUBS WILL CLASH; LARGE PURSE OFFERED

\$20,000 in Cash Added Incentive to Winner of Pennant

SAN FRANCISCO, April 3. (AP)—With a \$20,000 prize as an added incentive, eight Pacific coast league clubs, weather permitting, will swing into action today in the opening games of the 1928 baseball season.

The Seattle Indians and the San Francisco Seals are slated to try the lid off here, while Hollywood's rejuvenated stars open across the bay with Oakland.

Sacramento plays host to the divisions at the capital city, and the Portland Beavers are scheduled to make it an all-California opening day by taking on the Angeles at Los Angeles.

The schedule will be played on a split season basis, the first half of 13 weeks ending July 3 and the second half October 4. The winners of each half will meet in a play-off series for \$15,000 to be divided on a sixty-fifty basis. The remaining \$5,000 of the prize money going to the clubs holding third and fourth place in total percentage. In the event one club is returned the winner in both halves of the season, that team will draw down the \$15,000 and the remainder split up by the second and third position teams.

Thirty-Four Rounds Boxing Scheduled for Chiloquin's Fight Card Wednesday Eve

CHILOQUIN, Apr. 3.—Thirty-four rounds of fast boxing will be dished up to the fight fans of Klamath county Wednesday evening, April 4 at the Chiloquin arena according to Damon Savage, matchmaker for the Chiloquin boxing commission.

A double main-event, featuring Gene O'Grady, Ashland middleweight, against Joe Blackwell, Eugene boxer, in the first ten round bout and Monte Rogers of Hood River, against Jack Harmon, Klamath Falls welterweight, in the second ten-round bout will wind up a bang-up good card. Interest is keen over both main event bouts both in Klamath Falls and here at Chiloquin. O'Grady has appeared twice in the local ring and downed his opponents both times and Blackwell comes down with a long string of knockout victories to his credit. Blackwell seems confident that he can put the Ashland farmer to sleep.

The second half of the double bill is attracting the most interest and much money is reported

to have been bet on the outcome of this battle. Mt. Hebron, over in northern California, has sent in an order for 60 ringside seats and are betting all the money they can on Harmon. Chiloquin is backing Roger. Just in string with even money reported on most bets. Dorris, Luff, also has an order in for a big crowd of ringside seats. Both these towns are going strong for Harmon as is Klamath Falls.

Supporting these two fights will be a six-round special event with Joe Swindler, the fighting deputy sheriff, facing an unknown "darkhorse" in K. O. Ross, Los Angeles heavyweight. Both boys are out for blood and this should be exciting as Ross wants a chance at Gorman in some future fight and is out to show his wares.

Teddy Moore, reservation 140-pound champion, faces Frankie Monroe of Salem in the crucible test of his fighting career. Harold Wright, Indian band man, will meet Ray Reynolds, of Shaw-Beitram, in the other four round bout.

Another Tennis Squabble

Just when everything seemed lovely and sweet and serene with the executives of the United States Lawn Tennis association and Bill Tilden and Frank Hunter, each other all over the place, a new issue arose to disturb peace. The association is accustomed to issues between executives and players against executive when Dr. Summer Hardy, head of the California association, said the national body was making bumps out of young players.

He exploded in wrathful language when the association ordered the young candidates for the Davis cup team to report to Bill Tilden, captain of the team, in Augusta, Ga., to take part in trial matches for places on the team that will play Mexico in the first round of the eliminations.

Several of the young players drafted refused to leave college classrooms to play in a phony trial series because they knew it was a foregone conclusion that Bill Tilden and Frank Hunter would be the regular players on the team.

It is a rather inconsistent attitude on the part of the association because when Tilden wanted the American team entered in the European zone the association was shocked that he should dare assume that the young players could be summoned from the classroom and then the association ordered the boys out of school.

Dr. Hardy said he was opposed to training young players to make a business out of tennis and some of the fathers of the young players may feel the same way. It can't be argued that every one of the high-ranking tennis players are making a business out of the game even if the returns do come indirectly.
