Scott Warren of Klamath Falls Ripe for First String Berth

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, April 5. (Special)—After a three-week lay-off for examinations and spring vacation, spring football practice at the University of Oregon was resumed this week, with the first scrimmage drill scheduled for Friday.

Scott Warren of Klamath Falls, sub tackle last year, is about ripe enough to break in as a regular. Scott has put on some weight since last fall and should scale nearly 200 pounds when fall practice starts.

Five lettermen will be lost to the 1928 team—Captain Beryl Hodgen and John Warren, guards; Homer Dixon, tackle, and Vic Wetzel and Frank Riggs, ends. Ted Pope and Tony Greer, ends, and Charles Williams, half, are eligible but are not in school this semester, while George Stadelman, star center, is out for the track team, and will not rejoin his football mates until next fall.
