

NINETY RACERS FACE 33D LAP

Inclement Weather Faces
Sturdy Transcontinental
Runners

ANARILLO, Tex., April 6. (AP)—Accepting the added handicap of adverse weather, the 90 runners and walkers remaining in the transcontinental marathon today turned toward Groom, 42 miles east of here.

The thirty-third lap of 27 miles from Vega yesterday was one of the most exciting since the start at Los Angeles March 4th.

As they lined up at Vega a flurry of snow offered variety from the clouds of Pan Handle that had engulfed the caravan. Rain followed the snow, continuing at intervals throughout the trek.

Pat Demarr of Los Angeles was the first to arrive here. His mark of 5:29:42 gave him an elapsed time of 297:24:44 for the 1,189 miles. John Salo, Pasquale, N. J., was second in 6:05:07. Andrew Payne, Oklahoma, Phillip Granville, Hamilton, Ont., and Arne Suominen of Detroit, finished less than 20 minutes behind Salo.

Allan Carrier, Grants Pass, Ore., finished 20th in 8:26:31 and 251:00:16 elapsed time.

Huggins Uses "Pennant" on Golf Course

Miller Huggins, midge manager of the world champion Yankees, boasts that he never took a golf lesson in his life and never will.

"Nobody ever taught me how to hit when I was playing ball," says Miller, "and I'm going to work this golf thing out myself." In spite of his somewhat cynical attitude towards the Scottish national game, Huggins is more of an ardent golfer than he admits.

Like all ball players and golfers he has his pet superstitions and hunches.

He has one very potent charm that he claims has never failed him yet in a pinch where he had to sink a long or short putt to win or halve a hole in a grudge match or with real money at stake.

Just before he strokes the ball towards the holes he shouts the word "pennant" and in it goes.

But as Huggins explained to me the days I played around with him "I only use it in cases of dire emergency. I shudder to think what would happen if I shouted 'pennant' and the ball didn't go in!"

SEATTLE, Wash., April 6. (AP)—With the first victory already chalked up for the southerners, three crews of the Universities of California and Washington were primed for the start of their annual regatta on Lake Washington late today.

The Bears took the jump yesterday when their four oared crew came from behind to win an unofficial mile race from the Husky substitutes by a five foot margin. The race was not timed.

If the dopesters are right, that is the only triumph that will be carried back to California from the 1928 regatta. The northern varsity was a slight favorite to win, while there were few doubts of the supremacy of the purple and gold junior varsity men sweepsters.

This is the first year that there has been any decided doubt among Seattle crew experts as to the outcome of the dual meet on Lake Washington. California's varsity is admittedly the strongest that has ever come north.

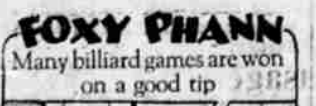

SUPREME COURT TO HEAR FISH WHEEL LAWSUIT

SALEM, Ore., April 6. (AP)—The United States supreme court will hear the Columbia river fish wheel case April 18, says a telegram received at the office of Attorney General Van Winkle. The act was declared unconstitutional by the federal district court in Portland in a case started by McGowan & Son. The act prohibited the operation of fish wheels in the Columbia, fishing with seines above Cascade Locks and limits the length of seines below the locks.
