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GRAHAM TRUCKS ACCOMPANY 90 HARDY RUNNERS

Cross-Nation Marathoners Afforded Some of Home Comforts

Running, walking or trotting from Los Angeles to New York as 90 athletes are now doing isn't first class travel.

But two Graham Brothers trucks are affording entries in the "hundred derby" some of the comforts of home. The athletes will at least hear radio programs and have coffee any time they want it. One of the trucks making the transcontinental trip carries a giant coffee pot containing two urns mounted on the rear where the runners can be served with stimulant along the way. The other truck carries a portable radio station that broadcasts encouraging and lively jazz music for the benefit of the runners.

The trucks left Los Angeles with the start of the race, March 4, headed for New York City, the eastern goal of the derby. More than 200 athletes started, but the number is dwindling under the strain of the daily grind. At the present pace, the race will not be finished until the early part of May.

Accurate records on the performance of the trucks and gasoline and oil consumption are being kept on the trip.
