GAVUZZI, PAYNE LEADING PACK

Fifty-Mile Trek Fails to Change Status of Runners

CLINTON, Okla., April 11. (A. P.)—With a 50-mile trek from Sayre failing to change the status of Andrew Payne and Peter Gavuzzi in the cross country marathon, these leaders today had a 35-mile jaunt to Bridgeport to further test their endurance.

Payne, who hails from Claremore, Okla., retained his leadership by covering the fifty miles yesterday in a dead heat with Gavuzzi in 8:21:40. This gave the Oklahoman an elapsed time of 234:54:37 for the 1,286 miles from Los Angeles. Gavuzzi, Southampton, England, entry, held second place with a total of 236:10:20. Eighty-two runners and walkers remain in the race to New York.

Allan Currier, Grants Pass, Oregon, finished yesterday's race in 9:50:28, total 304:44:50, ranks twentieth.

Paul Smith, Gates, Ore., finished in 10:13:59, total 312:46:02, ranks twenty-third.

LONGEST SWIM MADE; MAN IN TANK 46 HOURS

German Outswims Sea Lion, Which Fell Asleep During Test

HAMBURG, Germany, April 11. (A. P.)—A man today was acclaimed for victory over a sea lion who fell asleep in trying to outswim his human competitor. Otto Kemmerich, German professional swimmer, made the longest recorded continuous swim in human annals, plodding through the water for 46 hours. His pet California sea lion, Leo, who was to act as pacesetter, however, had been lifted drooping from the water four hours before, sound asleep.

In the meantime Kemmerich plodded along on a diet of fried eggs, coffee, cocoa and fruit. At the thirty-second hour he passed the record recently set by Mrs. Lottie Moore Schoemmel of New York. At the forty-sixth hour, unaided, he climbed from the tank.

LOOKING FOR FATHER.

LOS ANGELES, April 11. (A. P.)—Police authorities in the belief that Walter Collins, aged 9, who has been missing from his home here since March 19 last, started to Seattle on a childish search for his father, today appealed to the northern authorities for aid in this newest angle in the search.

The Seattle theory was adopted by the police when the boy's mother, Mrs. Christine Collins, informed them that the boy had been kept in ignorance of the fact that his father, Walter J. S. Collins, is a convict serving a five year term in Folsom prison. Instead, he has been told vaguely that his father was "in Seattle."

DEEP SNOW REPORTED

The state highway department rotary being used in the attempt to open the McKenzie pass to traffic, Sunday was "slowly" eating its way through snow drifts 14 feet deep, report Bend people who drove into the pass country. The plow was near the 14 mile post Sunday, bucking a path through packed snow. All the drifted snow has been removed from the road from Sisters to that point.

In places, the pass snow is so deep that the rotary is working below the surface. Several men are kept busy in the deep snow shoveling the overhanging banks and "tunnel" ceiling down to the mouth of the rotary. The snow being removed from the deep cuts is blown out of the roadway.

Bend folk who visited the pass area Sunday report that the plow, working in the deep snow trenches, makes an impressive appearance.

The rotary was nearing the big cut at the east approach to the lava beds Sunday.—Bend Bulletin.
