FIND BODY MURDERED MAN TODAY

Harry Wallace, Grants Pass Resident, Shot Through Head

AUTHORITIES WORK ON SLAYING THEORY

Victim Is Man Who Attempted to Shoot Rogue River Rapid—Police Attempt to Trace Down Mystery of Sudden Death—Bullet Had Been Fired From Rear.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Apr. 13. (A.P.)—A body which had been in the water for a considerable time was taken from the Rogue river at Murial, in the wilds of eastern Curry county, said a report received at Gold Beach. The report stated that a bullet wound was found in the head.

Later reports from Gold Beach today said the body of the man found in Rogue river just below Elsie yesterday was Harry Wallace, aged about 40, who undertook to shoot rapids from Grants Pass last January.

The body was found by Ram Meserve, who reported that a bullet hole was found in the back of the head.

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COUNCIL HOLDS TAXI HEARING

A hearing to determine whether or not the licenses of Cal Crews taxi service, Pat Hogue taxi service and the Hury taxi service would be cancelled was held today before the city council.

On the ground that owners or agents of the three services had been convicted on liquor charges recently and that city was empowered under these circumstances to cancel their licenses, Councilman Francis Olds, chairman of the police committee, moved last Monday night that the licenses be revoked. It was referred to a meeting of the council as a whole which was in session this afternoon.

Cal Crews, who pleaded guilty to a charge of sale of intoxicating liquor, testified on the witness stand that he had been "kangarooed."

Presidential Veto Of Farm Bill Predicted

WASHINGTON, April 13. (A.P.)—Bearing a majority of 30 senate votes in its favor, the McNary-Haugen farm relief bill rested today on the doorstep of the house where early action is expected to send it to the White House. There, an almost certain veto faces it for the second time.

Passed late yesterday by the senate by a vote of 43 to 32 as compared to the 47 to 39 sanction given it at the last session, the measure retained the controversial equalization fee which caused President Coolidge to veto the bill last year principally on the ground that this provision was unconstitutional.

Should the president again return the measure to congress without his approval, administration leaders in the senate doubt which either it could be passed over the veto even though the vote yesterday showed more than a two-thirds majority of those present for its. They believe that with a full membership present a two-thirds majority could not be obtained.

A farm board, appointed by the president with the consent of the senate, also would be set up and advisory councils, named by farm organizations, established for each commodity. Approval by the councils would be necessary before the fee was applied.

In arguing for executive approval, McNary contended that before the fee became effective plenty of time would be available for the courts to pass on its constitutionality.

PEACE PACT SOUGHT BY UNCLE SAM

France and U. S. Invite Other World Powers to Join

ANTI-WAR MEASURE IS GAINING GROUND

America Expresses Its Desire to See Institution of War Abolished on Globe—Stands Ready to Conclude Permanent Negotiations to This Effect With Nations.

WASHINGTON, April 13. (A.P.)—Great Britain, Germany, Italy, and Japan, were invited today to join France and the United States in the negotiations of a world-wide treaty, binding the nations not to resort to war with one another.

The invitation was extended by Secretary Kellogg, after an agreement on the procedure with Aristide Briand, foreign minister of France.

In a note to the four governments, presented simultaneously at London, Berlin, Rome and Tokyo today, by American diplomatic representatives, Mr. Kellogg outlined the discussions on the proposal between himself and M. Briand.

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BIGAMIST GETS TWO YEAR JOLT

ROSEBURG, Ore., April 13. (A.P.)—E. J. Mishand, who was brought back to Roseburg the first of the week from New Jersey, where he was arrested on a charge of bigamy against him from this county, was today sentenced to two years in the Oregon penitentiary.

Mishand waived grand jury indictment and entered a plea of guilty to the charge brought on a district attorney's information. He married Leah Mack of Roseburg in 1926, although he had a family in New Jersey at that time. He deserted the second wife in Montana a few months after the marriage and returned to New Jersey where he was later located and arrested.

Mrs. Lifer Wins.

PASADENA, Calif., April 13. (A.P.)—Mrs. Gregor Lifer of the California Country club defeated Miss Kathleen Wright of the Flintridge Country club 3 and 2 for the California women's state golf championship on the Flintridge course here today.

Secretary Asserts Hoover Wronged By Political Hecklers

WASHINGTON, April 13. (A.P.)—A strong defense of Secretary Hoover against charges that he has usurped some of the powers of the agricultural department and otherwise has worked to injure the farmer was made today by Secretary Jardine.

In a letter dated April 11 and made public today, the agricultural secretary told Charles S. Wilson, former commissioner of agriculture of New York state and now a farmer at Hall, New York, that "there is not the slightest essence of truth in these charges, and I would resent them if they were made with honest intentions."

Mr. Wilson, under date of April 1, had written Jardine saying he had heard the charge made that "Mr. Hoover, as secretary of commerce, has encroached upon the work of the department of agriculture and in other ways has hindered the operation of your department in the interest of the farmers."

"It has been my feeling," Wilson said, "that these charges were made for ulterior motives, but I have come to the conclusion that they were made with honest intentions."
