IDAHO HIT BY TICK DISEASE

BOISE, Idaho, April 13, (AP)—Six new cases of spotted fever have developed here, bringing the present total in the outbreak to seven it was shown in reports today to the city health authorities, who are combatting the disease.
Three of the cases developed within the city, while four were brought in from outlying districts for treatment.
Increasing number of cases of the disease, which has caused three deaths within the past week, has alarmed city health officers. Inoculations of serum have been given to all victims of the disease, and sheep herders and others who work among the sagebrush have been urged to come to Boise at the end of this week, when a government specialist in tick disease is expected to be here on his annual visit. He will inoculate exposed persons with the serum as a preventative measure.
