Al Karasick, the terrible Russian headlock artist of Portland, and Professor Higami, light-heavyweight champion wrestler of Japan, have been definitely signed by A. McDuffee, promoter of a wrestling elimination tournament sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars, to meet in Klamath Falls on April 19th to determine which will be survivor in the tourney.
