S. P. AND STAGE COMPANY FIGHT FOR BUSINESS

SALEM, Ore., April 13. (AP)—So keen has become competition between Pacific Stages Inc., and the Southern Pacific Motor Transport company between Portland and Hillsboro that the two propose to operate 35 vehicles daily except Sunday between the two points.

The Pacific Stages schedule, on file with the public service commission is to become effective May 1, while the Southern Pacific schedule, also filed with the commission, is to be effective May 1. The latter adds 11 cars from Portland to Hillsboro and 10 in the opposite direction.

Briand, and submitted a draft representing in a general way the form of treaty the United States is prepared to sign. Its language is practically identical with the original treaty proposed by M. Briand to the United States last June.

Desires Reply.
The four governments were told the United States "would be pleased to be informed as promptly as may be convenient whether they are in a position to give favorable consideration to the conclusion of a treaty such as transmitted, and, if not, what specific modifications in the text would make it acceptable."

With the note and draft treaty were presented a copy of the text of M. Briand's original proposal and copies of all the correspondence on the subject between France and the United States which have been made public heretofore. The views of the two governments, Mr. Kellogg said, were clearly set forth in the correspondence.

U. S. Ready.
"The government of the United States, as stated in its note of February 27, 1925, desires to see the institution of war abolished," Mr. Kellogg's note declared "and stands ready to conclude with the French, British, German, Italian and Japanese governments a single multilateral treaty open to subsequent adherence by any and all other governments binding the parties thereto not to resort to war with one another."
