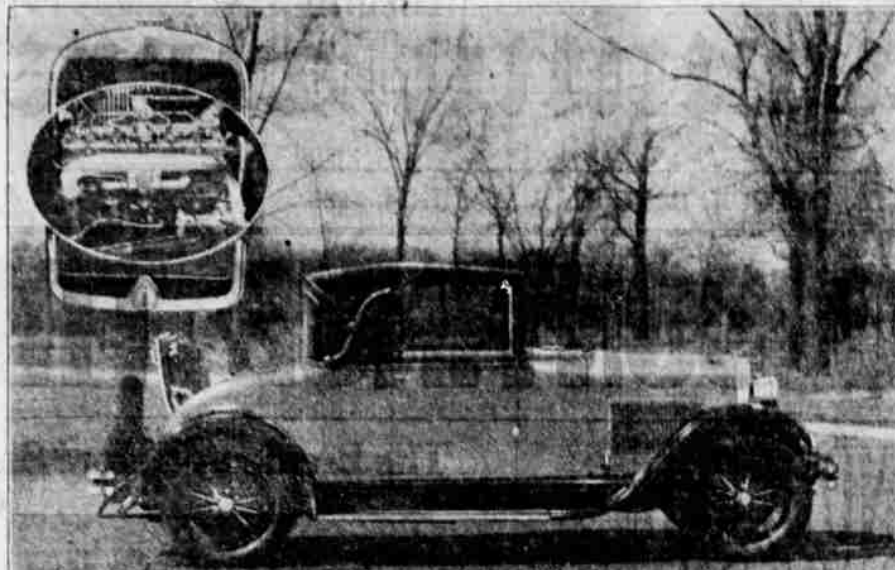

ROAD IS OPEN TO CRESCENT LAKE REPORT

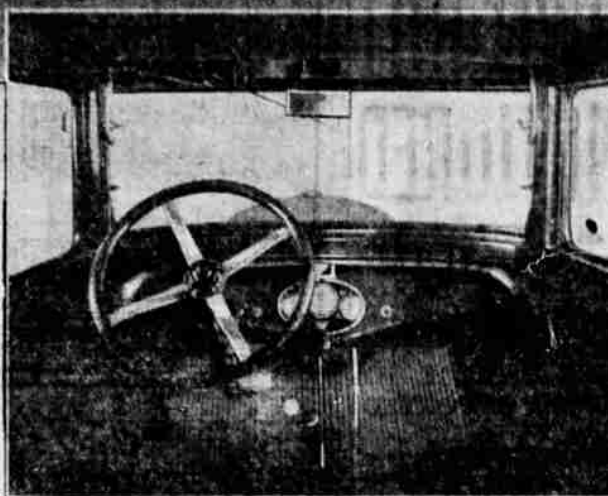
That the road is open to Crescent lake and that anglers stand an even chance of getting a good bag, is the word which was received here today.
