Plans for New Addition to Reames Golf Club House are On Display in K. K. K. Window

The model of an addition to the Reames Golf and Country club house, on display in the windows of the K. K. K. store, was designed by Mr. H. D. Mortenson, president of the Pelican Bay Lumber company. Mr. Mortenson at one time was chairman of the marketing committee of the California White Pine association, and in this connection made an exhaustive study of types of construction and architectural methods.

Having taken a great deal of interest in the welfare of the Reames Golf and Country club, Mr. Mortenson determined, last winter, to look out a plan for additions to the present club house, within the means of the club, which would, at the same time, give the club a modern and commodious home in accordance with the best principles of country club construction.

The model, as designed, makes use of the present club house by putting a long wing across and in front of the present building. The finish will be rustic. The outside of selected slabs and the inside beamed with the native lodge pole pine.

The present disagreeable feature of having to climb stairs to get into the club house will be done away with and the new porch will step off at grade. There will be an outside porch 18 feet in length, 24 feet on each side. Entrance to the main club house will be through French doors. This large club room in the new wing will be 32 feet by 65 feet, which is thought will provide a dancing floor suitable for any club parties, as well as a spacious room for general club uses at other times.

There will be a fireplace towards the east end of the main club room, which will not interfere with the dancing, but will break the large room and provide a smaller room at the east end.

This present front porch will serve as an inside balcony to the new structure, and the front part of the upstairs of the present club house will serve as a men's quarters, permitting the whole of the downstairs, part of which is now used for women's locker room, to be opened up and used for an enlarged men's locker room.

The plans call for a kitchen to be built at the rear of the new wing, and, if finances will permit, also a large basement, in which it is thought, an indoor practice court can be constructed, for winter use, and at other times during inclement weather.

Klamath Will Shoot Off Tie With Monitor

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 19. (AP)—Fifteen of the 28 gun clubs which made up the field in this year's Oregonian telegraphic trapshoot tournament will shoot a string of 25 targets Sunday in an effort to decide some of the scores which have been carried along for several Sundays and which were not broken before the regular series ended last week. The regular schedule closed last Sunday, and at that time there were 13 tie scores, practically all of them on perfect marks of 75. The ties not only affect the leaders of the tournament, but also clubs lower down the list which have a chance to land a place in the shoot-off, which will be held later at the Portland Gun club.

The 15 clubs affected by the ties are Coquille, Washington county, Echo, Bend, Lane county, Heppner, Roseburg, The Dalles, Siletz bay, Monitor, Klamath, Halsey, Yamhill county, Pendleton and Bandon. These are the clubs which will shoot a string of 25 birds this Sunday under the same rules and conditions that govern the regular telegraphic schedule.

This will be considered sufficient notice for the gunners to turn out Sunday. Any club failing to report its score to the trapshoot editor by 5 o'clock Sunday will forfeit its match.

Coquille is now leading the league with 21 matches won, two lost and four tied. Heppner is second with 23 won, three lost and one tied.

Andrew Payne Leads Gavuzzi By 15 Minutes

MIAMI, Okla., April 19. (AP)—A 24 mile trek across the corners of three states to Joplin, Mo., constituted today's program for the 77 runners and walkers in the cross country marathon.

Start of the tri-state lap found Andrew Payne of Claremore, Oklahoma, leading Peter Gavuzzi of Southampton, England, by less than 15 minutes in elapsed time for the 17.21.6 miles from Los Angeles. The Britisher crept up on Payne yesterday by leading the pack in the 51 mile jaunt from Chelsea in 6:48:23. Payne and Ed Gardner, Seattle Negro, tied for fifth in 8:31:30.

This gave the Oklahoman an elapsed time of 287:42:23. Gavuzzi's total was 287:55:38. Although John Salo, Pascale, N. J., was slowed to 12:02:45 by a stomach ailment, he retained third place with 329:17:32.

Allen Currier, Grants Pass, finished in 11:56:42 with 373:06:18 elapsed time.

Risko and Dunn, Both Dumb, Have Stepped Into Big Money

Less than a year ago Johnny Risko spent a week in an argument with Cleveland promoters to get one-half per cent more of the gate receipts than the promoters offered him to fight Jack De Mave.

"Sixteen per cent is all we can give you, John," they told him. "Eighteen or nothing," he parried.

"Let's compromise at 17 then," they suggested.

"Seventeen and a half and I sign," Risko demanded.

The matchmaker called his backer and asked him about the price.

"Give him 17 1/2, but keep him guessing. Make him come back a couple of times," the backer said.

Risko came back to the office every day for a week. What he spent in time, shoe leather and gasoline must have consumed the extra half per cent he got because his purse was only \$450.

This gave him the reputation of being thick-headed and a sap.

The same Risko is now in the big dough. He got \$24,015 eight months later for whipping Jack Sharkey in New York and in another six months it might be that he will be dragging down close to a half million as the challenger's end of a championship fight or in other large shots.

His friends say that he now has one hundred grand socked away and that a great many of those grands are socked so safely that they will stay socked. For a boy just a few years out of a bakery that is not so bad.

Considering that he is generally rated as a dumb-bell it might be considered unusual that he would attempt to do his own business with crafty promoters. At the time of the negotiations for the De Mave fight, mentioned above, the promoters were struck with the same thought.

"Why don't you let Danny talk business for you?" they asked him, referring to Danny Dunn, his manager.

Risko then referred to a story told about the manager of Billy Wallace, high ranking Cleveland lightweight, which the promoters say is a true story.

Wallace was offered a fight and his manager was told to ask for \$15,000, to put up an argument for \$12,500 and to take not less than \$10,000.

When he went to do business with the promoters he said: "We want \$15,000, we ought to get at least \$12,500, but we won't take a cent less than \$10,000."

"Sold for \$10,000," the promoters said and they signed the contracts.

Risko had the right idea of naming his price and sticking to it, but he finally decided to let
