## FORMER BOXER HAS ENTRY IN "TUCKY DERBY"

NEW YORK, April 20.—There's a horse named Rumpelstiltskin entered in the Kentucky Derby and its owner is—Packey McFarland, once the uncrowned lightweight champion of the world.

McFarland, with his financial status now such that a hundred dollar note means nothing to him, is giving most of his time to his stable of horses. 20 in all. "Rumpelstiltskin is a German horse, imported last year," says McFarland, "and he's pretty good. He may not win the derby, but I expect that experience will do him a lot of good in future races. ## Karasick Slams His Way to Victory Over Prof. Higami

After losing one fall to Prof. Higami last night at Scandia hall Al Karasick, Russian light heavy-weight, took the second fall by the good old rough-house tactics of picking the Japanese up and slamming him to the mat with such force that although he gamely came back for the third fall, he was so weakened that the Russian took the third and deciding fall in one minute.

The match was rough and spectacular. The Jap was out-weighted by at least ten pounds, but on the other hand, Karasick was handicapped by a bad wrist, which was nearly broken in a recent automobile accident.

The Jap weakened himself by attempting to headlock Karasick. The Russian would let him take a headlock when he liked, and he had a rule with the professor to the mat with about as much effort, apparently, and using about the same method, that an angry bull would use in tossing an annoying dog on his horns.

## WOOL MARKET MARKING TIME

General Condition Is Quiet in East, Bulletin Reports

BOSTON, April 20. (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say: "The wool market is marking time for the moment, as is also the case with the market for goods. Occasional small piling out sales are reported and some buying forwarded by manufacturers when prices slide, but the market as a whole is no more than steady although most dealers are optimistic concerning the future."

"In the west there is little that is new, scattering purchases being at unchanged prices."

"Foreign markets are generally quiet with prices barely steady in Bradford."

"Mohair is quiet at the eastern seaboard markets and manufacturers are by no means ready to absorb the prices recently paid at country points."

The crowd booed Karasick for attempting to throw the Jap out among the audience, in which he would have been successful on four or five occasions had not the professor laid fast hold of the ropes. This invariably infuriated the Jap, and he would bounce back into the ring like an infuriated cat, and give Karasick the doubtful benefit of all his very considerable store of strength, skill and gameness.

The first fall came at the end of 19 minutes of the fastest wrestling fans have ever been treated to in Klamath Falls, when the wiry Jap forced Al to give up with a toe hold.

Karasick came back strong, and dumped the Jap to the mat three or four times in succession with such force that he was knocked out. Karasick used the flying mare and an airplane spin in finishing the professor. The second fall came after 12 minutes of wrestling.

No one looked for Higami to come back after such punishment, but he was game. Gameness wasn't enough, however, and the Russian finished him for the third fall in 60 seconds with a back breaking crab hold.

Hank Burke of Pelican City took the first and third falls in his match with Frank Burns of Portland. Burns seemed stronger at first, but the wiry Burke slipped an arm across on him that accounted for the first fall. Burns took the second fall with headlock and half nelson, but Burke came back stronger than ever.
