## Interesting Old Letters—

Interesting old letters dating back more than 80 years, written by Benjamin Franklin Jacobs of Vermont, the grandfather of Mrs. George Barnhart of the Barnhart Shop, have been added to Mrs. Barnhart's collection of interesting literature and relics. The letters told of the prices of various articles including: Eggs, six cents a dozen; potatoes at 21 cents a bushel; beef, \$3 per one hundred pounds; butter at 12 1/2

cents; oats, 28 cents a bushel and corn at 31 cents a bushel. The letters were sent to Mrs. Barnhart by her mother who has reached the age of 80 years. In the article Mr. Jacobs, who was writing to a brother told of the wonderful railroad project under construction from the Mississippi to Milwaukee and how he looked forward to the coming 15 years when untold developments would be realized. In the Barnhart Shop, Mrs. Barnhart has a number of antique chains which have been in her family for more than 75 years. Among other things which she has collected from her ancestors is a ring which is more than 150 years old. It was used to hook rag rags by her great great grandmother. An interesting feature of the letters

was the fact they were in no envelope, but instead were folded to look like an envelope and then sealed. In those days the receiver paid the postage on the letters.
