



### BASIN GUNNERS TO MEET BEND

#### Inter-County Trap Shoot Will be Held Tomorrow at Club

Klamath and Bend scatter gun artists will match their respective shooting eyes tomorrow morning and afternoon in an inter-county shoot at the Klamath Gun club tomorrow afternoon.

The Bend trap shooters will arrive on the scene of battle at 10 a. m. and immediately thereafter the various events will be run off in regular order.

The first event will be a 50 target shoot at 16 yards; the second, a 50 target handicap shoot; and the third a 25 target team shoot.

Other events which might take place if the weather is favorable include a jackrabbit shoot, and a red bird shoot. The latter is a particularly trying affair. Gunners will stand up and fire at a given number of birds. Along the clay pigeons will be one that is painted red. If the trap shooter to whose lot it comes to fire at the bird, misses it, he must pay a stipulated amount to all the other gunners. If he hits it, all the gunners pay him.

On the 50 target 16 yard shoot will be a special prize for the high gun of the visiting team. On the 50 target handicap shoot, free-for-all, there will be a special prize for a \$15 fishing rod. No additional fee will be charged for the special shoot and targets and shells will be the same price, club officials announced.

### LAST GAPS OF N. C. O. PROJECT BEING CLOSED

LAKEVIEW, Ore., April 21.—Closing up the last gaps in the line into Lakeview, N. C. O. construction trains have been distributing materials within the city limits the past few days. This work is expected to be completed during the next few days and the entire line in readiness for tracklaying crews.

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### RESERVOIR IN WESTERN LAKE COUNTY FILLED

LAKEVIEW, Ore., April 21.—For the second time since its construction 14 years ago, Drews reservoir is full. Water in the reservoir is now at the 55 foot mark where it will be kept until the irrigating season opens.

Last year there was as much water behind the dam as there is at present, but that was the first time since the construction of the irrigating system that water had been raised higher than 43 feet. For some time the irrigation company has been releasing the water of the reservoir through the spillway, but recent rainfall has kept the water level constant despite the opening of the gates.

At the 55 foot level the reservoir contains some 45,000 acre feet of water, a quantity sufficient for two to three years use on the lands under the project in Goose Lake valley.
