NEW YORK, April 23. (AP)—Gene Tunney is back in New York, ready to start training for his heavyweight title defense against the plodding Anzac, Tom Heeney, in July, and quite reconciled to Tex Rickard's program of one championship "shot" a year.

After a week here Tunney plans to start on a program of light training in Speculator, New York.

Tunney arrived from Miami Beach, Fla., yesterday in time to characterize as "ridiculous" reports that he planned to tour Europe on a "honeymoon" after he battles Heeney.

SPEED RECORD BROKEN SUNDAY

Young American Sets New Mark at Daytona Beach, Fla.

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla., April 23. (AP)—The world's automobile speed record was today written beside the name of a young American, Ray Keech and the figures were 207.55 miles an hour.

The 27-year old driver wrestled the "fastest time on earth" from Captain Malcolm Campbell, the Englishman, by a scant margin of half a mile an hour yesterday when he roared off an average mile in 17.34 seconds at the wheel of J. M. White's "Triplex Special."

Success followed a series of heart breaking failures, the last of which came a few minutes before he broke the record when his first attempt of the day was thrown out because a timing device failed to function.

UHLE WINS 3D STRAIGHT GAME

Beats Browns, 2 to 1; White Sox Batter Tigers

(By The Associated Press) George Uhle, great right hander of the Cleveland Americans, apparently has returned to the form that enabled the Indians to give the New York Yankees a stern but futile chase for the American league pennant in 1926. His third straight triumph of the present campaign was scored, 2 to 1, over the Browns at St. Louis yesterday.

Ineffective pitching sent the Washington Senators down to defeat, 8 to 5 at the hands of Boston at the capital.

The Pittsburgh Pirates, champions last year, took undisputed possession of the cellar of the National league when they bowed to the Chicago Cubs, 3 to 2, in the first game of the series at Chicago, 50,000 persons, the largest crowd that ever saw a ball game in the city, were on hand.

Rain forced postponement of the National league series between Brooklyn and New York and St. Louis and Cincinnati as well as that between the Yankees and Philadelphia in the junior circuit.

GEESE WINGING WAY TO NORTH

Cackle and Cry of Birds Heard Each Morning and Evening

Early each morning and towards dusk of each late afternoon, the cackle and cry of thousands of geese, is heard as they wing their way over Klamath on their annual flight to the north. For days the migratory birds have been evacuating Tule lake where they pass each year for several weeks on their way back to the northland.

Not until next fall will the birds return to the Klamath country to stay for several months feeding in the lakes, marshes and grain fields of the Klamath basin.

FISHING IN KLAMATH RIVER POOR SUNDAY

An anglers' convention was held on the Klamath river below Keno Sunday. The famous rainbow trout belabored with nearly every lure known to man—from worms to plugs—and the net result of the human invasion is that, with a few notable exceptions, the fish population remains undisturbed.

Men, women and children tried their luck with almost uniform failure and the general consensus of opinion was that either the fish "weren't" or they were gorged with natural food carried down the stream by high waters.

Water snakes, lizards and thousands of frogs populated the rocks along the river, warming themselves in the afternoon sun. "Wait until the water goes down," was the advice of disappointed anglers who wended their weary way home with empty creels. "There is too much natural food in the water at this time."

However there were a few of the more experienced anglers whose skill netted from three to six fine rainbows; but, as said before, these were in the decided minority.

Iowa Thinks Soph Runner Sure For Olympic Trip



Vaughn W. Stevenson, a sophomore at the University of Iowa, became an outstanding candidate for the United States Olympic team recently when he ran 300 yards in 29.8-10 seconds. The recognized world's record is 29.6-10 seconds, made by Bernie Waters in 1896, and the American record was 30.2-10 seconds, made by Charley Paddock in 1921. In making his fast time, Stevenson barely defeated George Baird, Iowa, who holds the western conference indoor quarter-mile record. Baird was timed in 23.9-10 seconds. They are members of the Iowa mile relay team.
