

SEVENTY-THREE SURVIVE RACE

Andrew Payne Retains 36 Minute Lead Over Peter Gavuzzi

WAYNESVILLE, O., April 24. (AP)—C. C. "Cross Country" Pyle's union derbyists, 73 survivors of an original field of 199, left here for the 52nd day of travel which will carry them to Rolla, 34 miles east of here today.

Andrew Payne, Claremore, Okla., youth, retained a 36-minute margin over Peter Gavuzzi of England, when the two lapped through the 51.9 mile lap from Conway, Monday, which Phillip Granville, Hamilton, Canada, and Ed Gardner, Seattle, both negroes, finished in 7:42:06. Payne has covered the 1,936.1 miles from Los Angeles in 224:54:52.

Today's course was over a hard packed gravel highway in the heart of the Ozarks. The runners and walkers will strike pavement Wednesday as they near Sullivan, their control point for the night.

Allan Currier, Grants, Pa., finished in 16:20:49; and 418:05:03 elapsed time.

YOUNG FIGHTER GETS DRAW IN M. McTIGUE GO

SAN FRANCISCO, April 24. (AP)—Armand Emanuel, young undefeated San Francisco boxer, kept his record unblemished when he fought Mike McTigue, twice light heavyweight champion, to a ten-round draw in their bout at the Armory last night.

A near capacity crowd saw the 22-year-old San Francisco attorney, a protégé of Jack Dempsey, give the veteran New Yorker a tough evening. Most of the newspaper critics allowed him an edge in a majority of the rounds, although the referee, Toby Irwin, figured that McTigue was entitled to an even break because of his aggressiveness.

T. LOWN KAYOES ADVERSARY IN OPENING CANTO

BOSTON, April 24. (AP)—Tommy Lown of New York, one of the greatest amateur boxers in this country, today was well on his way to his fourth national title. He started out in an auspicious manner in the A. U. championship tournament last night by scoring a one-round knockout in his trial bout in the 147 pound class. Lown started his march to his fourth title by knocking out Frank Miller of Buffalo. Hoffman also made an impressive start by forcing the hand of Walter Laver, Pennsylvania military academy student, to toss in the towel before the start of the third round.

MILL EMPLOYE MAY LOSE FOOT

While yet unable to determine whether it will be necessary to amputate the left foot of Roy Moon, employee of the Pelican Bay mill who was seriously injured on Monday, the attending physician was encouraged with the young man's condition today, according to reports from the Klamath General hospital. Moon, while driving a horse about the lumber yard at Pelican Bay, got his leg entangled in a heavy chain, the weight of which threw him to the ground where he was dragged for some distance. When assistance reached Moon he was rushed to the hospital where every possible effort is being made by the attending physician and hospital attendants to save his foot.

thousands of acres of spring crops.

Georgia appeared to have borne the brunt of damage. Cordel reported four railroads into Florida and Alabama paralyzed and all highways blocked.

Eight and a half inches of rain fell at Blakely, now isolated, in five hours, and at Tipton, eight and one-fourth inches fell in 24 hours; Sylvester reported \$100,000 crop, highway and railroad damage; the Ocmulgee river was one and a half feet above flood stage at Macon; Moultrie reported the worst rain in thirty years, while Pelham counted tornado damage.

Many Alabama towns were isolated, including Andalusia and Castlederry, where three passenger trains were marooned. Milledgeville, near Montgomery, the capital, reported that the Tallapoosa had risen 15.6 feet and was surging higher. Several hundred persons were reported driven from their homes at Brewton, Ala., when two creeks spread over the town.

All roads in southern Alabama were practically impassable while several houses were leveled by a storm between Monroville and Petron.

Pearl River Rises.

In Mississippi the Pearl river had risen to 28.8 feet near Jackson, and was flooding low areas of the town. The Tombigbee was 28 feet and still rising at Columbus, with lowland crops ruined. Northwestern Florida and southern Alabama damage was estimated by Pensacola, Fla., authorities at around \$500,000 while from isolated Graceville, Fla., came word that roads and bridges were washed out, and crops in that territory lost to the extent of about \$200,000.

At Milton, Fla., half the fruit crop was reported damaged. From Memphis, Tenn., 15,000 bags of sand had been shipped into eastern Arkansas for emergency work on levees. The Ouachita was threatening south Arkansas with slight inundations, while the Arkansas had flooded Towlands near Fort Smith.

Authorities were hopeful that the recession of flood waters, except in Arkansas would be as rapid as was their rise, but the crest in many areas should not be reached until tomorrow.
