the grind. As running mates I

had Andrew Payne of Claremore,

Oklahoma's own entry in the race

who has been leading for several

days, and Peter Gavuzzi of Eng-

land, his nearest rival.

You who run perhaps for your

street cars some days, may know

what running is like. You reach

the car out of breath, ready to

sit right down and puff your head

off after only a block or two of

intensive effort.

Think of these men! After we

had gone two miles on our run,

I began to think my chest was

bursting, my feet were on fire,

my muscles like red-hot wires,

drawing tighter at every bounce.

Yet these runners have gone

through California, Arizona, New

Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma! As I

sat nursing the swollen appen-

dages that once I was able to

put shoes on, I realized that this

was a race at all—it's a miracle.

Thirty miles in 5 hours 28

minutes and 30 seconds—and the

same old pace, day after day and

week after week!

DR. W. SEYMOUR SHOT IN CHINA AFTER ESCAPE

SHANGHAI, April 25. (AP)—Dr. Walter F. Seymour, superintendent of the Presbyterian board of foreign missions hospital at Tsinan, southeast Shanghai, was shot to death by a Chinese soldier.

Dr. Seymour was shot through the heart on April 14.

Because of interrupted communications in Shanghai, the news of the shooting only reached here today. The interruption is due to the present fighting between the nationalists and northerners in Shanghai province, Tsinan which is about 15 miles from Yenchowfu, being in the center of the disturbed area.

Mrs. Seymour and other missionaries at Tsinan are believed to be safe. It is thought that they are unable to leave the region because it is run over by nationalist soldiers moving northward.

DALLAS, Tex., April 25. (A. P.)—Wesley Ogston who escaped from the federal penitentiary, McNeil Island, off the coast of Washington where he was serving 99 years for the murder and maiming of a soldier in Paris during the world war, was arrested at a hotel here today.

Confronted with prison records and photographs, Ogston admitted his identity and said that he escaped from the McNeil prison eight months ago by sawing through the roof.

PRESIDENT IS CRITICISED BY SENATOR DILL

WASHINGTON, April 25. (AP)—President Coolidge was charged by Senator Dill, democrat, Washington, today with violating the spirit of the constitution in retaining Commissioner Esch on the I. C. C. through a recess appointment despite his rejection by the senate.
