THYE CRASHES KARASICK FOR DECIDING FALL

Russian Headlock Artist Is Flattened By Titleholder

PORTLAND, April 26, (AP)—"Red" Thye, light heavyweight wrestling title claimant, in his farewell appearance before his departure for Australia, took two out of three falls from Al Karasick here last night. It was a battle of wristlocks against head-



lock. The first fall went to Karasick after 13 minutes, 22 seconds of speedy wrestling. The Russian brought Thye to the mat with a series of headlocks and then stretched him out with a short arm scissors. Falling in his efforts to wristlock Karasick, Thye dived for his legs, securing a crotch hold which brought him the second fall in 30 minutes, 40 seconds. The third fall ended after 8 minutes, 40 seconds when Thye broke Karasick's headlock, picked him up and slammed him to the mat. In the 30 minute preliminary T. Higami took one fall and decision from Frank Burns.

GOTHAM BOUND RUNNERS PLOD STEADILY EAST

English Runner Has Slight Lead Over Andrew Payne, Okla.

SULLIVAN, Mo., April 26, (AP)—C. C. "Cross Country" (Sle's) New York bound canyon pushed out of here over the concrete highway to Hillside View, 47 miles eastward today.



Hillside View, the runners and walkers' 25th control will be an overnight stop before proceeding an additional 27 miles to East St. Louis, Ill., after swinging through St. Louis Friday.

Peter Gavuzzi, England, had a lead of 22 minutes and 41 seconds over Andrew Payne, Claremore, Okla., when they started



this morning after finishing second to Philip Granville, Canada, on the 42.9 mile lap from Rolla Wednesday. Granville's time for the day was 5:45:29. Gavuzzi's 6:00:13 and Payne's 7:05:04. Payne's previous edge was 26 minutes. Allan Currier, Rogue River, Oregon, 5:58:46, elapsed time 433:38:45.

Jack Dempsey Kayoes Kearns Out of Court

NEW YORK, April 26, (AP)—Jack Dempsey had another knockout to his credit today. His one time manager, Jack Kearns, went down for the count in the federal district court, losing a suit for \$761,000.

And last night, after allowing a jury to find only on two questions of fact, Judge C. Knox delivered the final blow to Kearns' claims by directing a verdict for Dempsey after four days of interesting testimony to fluster rail birds. The jury decided that Dempsey had entered a valid three year contract with Kearns in August, 1923, while the former champion was training for his title defense against Luis Pipo, and that this contract was terminated in 1925 by mutual consent in Los Angeles, when the pair of Jacks, after months of bickering and publicity, split their joint property holdings of over \$500,000.

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SMALL HEAD OF WATER TURNED IN U. S. CANAL

The water which means life to farms in the Klamath basin was turned into the government canal Wednesday morning at 8:30, according to Herbert D. Newell, reclamation project superintendent, when four gates at Upper Klamath lake were opened.

Two-tenths of a foot head was turned into the canal, which has been undergoing the usual repairs for several weeks to accommodate the flow.

It will be a week or 10 days before full elevation in the canal is reached, Newell stated. "We will allow the water to rise slowly in order to check the system and to determine that the canal is in shape to handle the water without leakage.

It is not expected that any irrigating will be done before about May 5, it was said.

Meeting of Railroad Celebration Committee to be Held Tonight

A meeting of the railroad celebration committee is scheduled for tonight at the chamber of commerce, when further plans will be outlined for the big fête in Klamath Falls May 11 and 12.
