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HOOKS AND SLIDES

Although not very much has been said about it this spring, the name of Johnny Mostil probably will be read often this summer in the lineup of the Chicago White Sox.

And if so—just how good will Mostil be?

Just a year ago, before injuries forced him out, Mostil was rated one of the great outfielders of the game. He was a dangerous hitter, an excellent base runner and one of the swiftest men in the field.

Then Mostil forced himself out. It was thought he never would be able to play major league baseball again and, if fortunate enough to do so, hardly would be anything near his old self.

Johnny is back. He may not play regularly for the Sox this summer, but he will be in there ever so often and there's no telling just how his game will be.

Confidence in himself is the big thing Johnny needs. He always was a bit lacking in this characteristic, but it is the thing he needs more than ever now. Encouragement he has now and always has had from Manager Ray Schalk and other baseball players.

Russell "Lena" Blackburne, Schalk's assistant at Chicago, thinks Johnny will have a big year. He doesn't believe that Mostil will play regularly, but he does think he will be inserted as a pinch hitter and runner in many games this summer, and perhaps will be in the lineup for entire games at a time.

"Mostil made some great catches during spring training, and I have a good hunch that the old boy will be the Mostil of old," he says. "Just wait and see for yourself."

Here's hoping Blackburne is correct in his deductions. With Mostil back in the form he once exhibited, he would be a welcome addition to that White Sox outfield, at present a very capable one with Bibb Falk, Bobby Barrett, Randy Moore and Alex Metzler doing chores for Schalk.

WILSON TO END CAREER

Unless something happens soon, the last Army-Navy contest for no one knows how long will be staged on June 2 when the soccer teams of the two government institutions meet.

Incidentally, that game will be the last time the Navy will have to contend with Harry Wilson in the garb of an opponent.

Since their squabble over the three-year eligibility rule it has been understood that the two schools would have no further athletic relations after July 1. That decision was reached months ago. It is unchanged now and the soccer game is the last of the contests to be held between the two schools.

For seven years, while attending Penn State and West Point, Wilson has been competing against the Midshipmen. He has taken part in victories and has suffered defeats many times, but the soccer game will be his last victory or defeat.

AVIATOR DIES AS PARACHUTE STAYS CLOSED

ROME, April 27. (AP)—Lieutenant General Alessandro Giandoni, former Italian air attaché at Washington, was killed today when a parachute with which he jumped from an airplane over the Montecello flying field, failed to open.

Lieutenant Fieri, who was piloting the plane, said the general possibly had made the jump too quickly. The ropes wound around his body and the parachute failed to spread.

This was the first time in more than 2,000 launchings that this particular type of parachute failed to open.

SANDINO HOLDS MINE MANAGER

WASHINGTON, April 27. (AP)—State department advisers today said G. B. Marshall, American manager of La Luz mines in Nicaragua, is still held prisoner by Sandino's forces. Consul Samuel J. Fletcher at Bluefields telegraphed:

"The only employee of La Luz Mining company in danger is G. B. Marshall. Rumors indicate he is still in the hands of Sandino but is being well cared for at Bonanza mine where, according to rumors, Sandino is entrenching."

DROP C. BIGBEE FROM PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., April 27. (AP)—Carson "Skeeter" Bigbee, outfielder of the Portland club of the Pacific coast league, was given unconditional release today. He has batted less than .500 since the start of the season. Bigbee was picked up by

Thomas L. Turner, president of the Portland club, after Seattle released him last summer. Between July 1 and the end of the season he averaged .294 at bat.

Orlin Berry, 19-year-old Saultelle, Calif., catcher, also was given his unconditional release. While showing much promise he was considered too young to keep.
