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WALTER HAGEN OVERWHELMED IN GOLF MATCH

Lanky Englishman Defeats American in International Match

MOORE PARK, Rug., April 28. (A. P.)—Walter Hagen barely saved his golf match with Archie Compston over 72 holes for 150 pounds from becoming a rout today. He went to lunch downy 18 and was unable to win but one hole of the 18 played this morning.

As Hagen was in a hopeless position, Compston needing to have one hole this afternoon to win, it was announced that the two men will play an exhibition match after Compston finally clinches the victory.

All through the 18 holes, Hagen fought heroically, but the lanky Englishman never gave him the ghost of a chance. Compston went around in par figures of 70 against Hagen's 74.

Never before had Hagen suffered such a defeat nor had the major golf world seen one star defeat another of Hagen's standing so decisively.

Compston excelled in driving and on the greens. Hagen displayed a glaring lack of ability to stop a ball on them from an approaching distance. He was woefully without the putting genius at which heretofore Britain had marvelled.

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Oregon State Beats U. of O.

EUGENE, April 28. (A. P.)—Taking six of the nine events, the Oregon State college relay stars walked off with the first relay carnival to be held between the states and the University of Oregon yesterday.

The Beavers began by taking the 440 yard relay, the two-mile relay and the 880-yard relay. Oregon bucked up and took the shuttle hurdle, a special event in which each hurdler ran 120 yards over the high sticks. Oregon State took the sprint medley and the four-mile relay, and then the university won the shot put, relay and the mile relay. Oregon State wound up the events by taking the distance medley.

JOHNNIE RISCO LIKELY TO MEET GENE TUNNEY IN SEPTEMBER, REPORT

NEW YORK, April 28.—Johnny Risko, Cleveland heavyweight, who was nosed out by Tom Heeney for a chance at the heavyweight championship in July, may meet the champion in September.
Rivals of Tex Rickard want to match Risko and Jack Dempsey and if Risko wins to match him with Gene Tunney for the title.
Jack Fugazy, New York promoter, wants the match and Tunney has let him know that he will be free to do business with any promoter after the Heeney fight.

HOOKS AND SLIDES

There are a number of reasons why Tom Heeney was selected as the opponent for Gene Tunney in the next heavyweight championship fight, but the big reason and the compelling one was that Tunney insisted upon his choice.

There were other angles that contributed to Tex Rickard's decision to give the air to the other challengers and select Heeney. He is a big fellow, has a creditable record and he has that international tint, if it is not, actually color, that Rickard may be able to dangle up into a good advertising picture.

Heeney also is honest. No one doubts his purposes or questions his motives and after all the talk of a "fixed fight" in which he won the championship, Tunney would like to have a man in there beyond reproach.

The big thing which influenced the selection of Heeney, however, was the conviction of the champion that he would look better in beating Heeney than he would, for instance, in beating Johnny Risko or Paulino.

Heeney Suits Gene

Tunney, even though he has boxed only 10 rounds in almost two years, should have no trouble in winning from Heeney on points. He won't knock him out, you can bet on that. Winning on points may be an unsatisfactory performance for a heavyweight champion in defense of his crown, but Tunney is used to it and he may be educating the public away from the idea that a champion ought to murder his man.

Heeney is built for the champion. A big, slow fellow who plods into his men. A fair boxer without much of a punch. A stand-up fellow who follows every orthodox move of boxing. After one or two rounds in which Tunney can slip him up in safety, he ought to be safe to make the fight his way for the rest of the

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
