BULLETS WOUND FILM PLAYERS

LOS ANGELES, April 28. (A. P.)—Two film players and their director have been wounded in a Hollywood gun battle.

Clara Bow, red-headed screen actress and Richard Arlen, the actor, each received minor flesh wounds in their legs and William Weedman, their director, was struck in an eye by a piece of metal from a bullet as a result of too much realism injected into the filming of a scene.

The filming of the picture, a crook drama, called for a gun battle between the police and the two principals. Actual bullets were used for realistic effects with Jack Ganzhorn, gun expert, wielding the rifle.

Property men had arranged sheets of steel armor plate to stop the flying bullets which were shot through windows, mirrors and other objects on the set. Ricocheting bullets bouncing off the armor plate, caused the wounding of the actors and the directors.

TWO KILLED IN S. F. EXPLOSION

SAN FRANCISCO, April 28. (A. P.)—Two workmen were killed and half a dozen injured when the Richmond Oil company tanker Richmond exploded shortly before noon today on the waterfront at the Union Iron Works.

The tanker, whose home port is Los Angeles, was towed into San Francisco Bay last night after it had become disabled at sea and was removed to the Union Iron Works early today for repairs.

Work of draining the oil from its tanks had just begun when the explosion occurred, with a roar that could be heard all over the water front.

A rush call was sent to all hospitals and fire apparatus hurried to the scene.

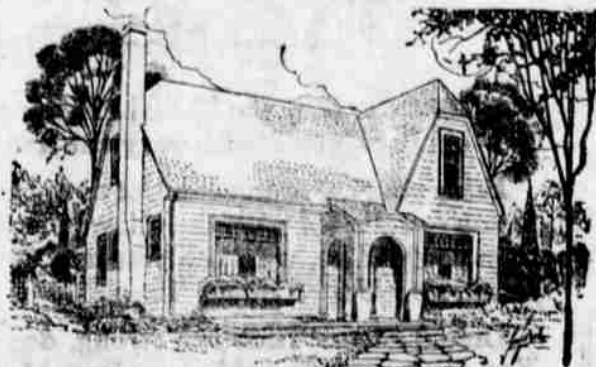

PLANES RUSHED TO NICARAGUA

WASHINGTON, April 28. (A. P.)—The marine corps is rushing five additional airplanes to Nicaragua to be used against Sandino's troops on the east coast.

The aircraft are being sent at the request of Brigadier General Logan Feland, commander of the marine expeditionary force in Nicaragua.

Two amphibian planes, equipped with machine guns, are aboard the supply ship Nitro, enroute from Hampton Roads to Puerto Cabezas and two more will be shipped from the same port as soon as possible. A huge Fokker transport plane, similar to three previously flown to Nicaragua, will leave the naval air station at Anacostia within ten days for a one stop flight to the Nicaraguan east coast. Lieutenant H. D. Palmer will command the craft and he will have a crew consisting of a mechanic and a radio operator.

D. LEWIS WINS BY KNOCKOUT

PENDLETON, Ore., April 28. (A. P.)—Danny Lewis, Portland welterweight, knocked out Harry O'Brien of Couer d'Alene in the fourth round of a ten round go here last night. Tommy Gardner, Walla Walla bantam, kayeed Willie Green, Portland, in the first round of a six round bout. Two other fights ended in knockouts.
