tion of the Continental deal whereby Standard and Sinclair companies paid a profit of 25c a barrel to the Continental Trading company, said that H. M. Blackmer, one of the organizers of the transaction, gave him the bonds. He had stipulated that his company should share in the commission, he said.

"I got it in the form of liberty bonds," he said. "They were sent to me over a period of two years."

"Beginning in 1922 and extending to when?"

"I think it was in the fall of 1922."

"From whom did you get the bonds?"

"From Mr. Blackmer. Some were sent by a messenger whose identity I do not know. Whether any were given to me by Mr. Osler I do not know."

This reference was to H. S. Osler, president of the Continental company.

Sinclair said he kept a record of the deliveries, but did not have that record now.

WASHINGTON, May 1. (AP)—Harry F. Sinclair, testifying today before the senate oil committee, said he had given Will H. Hays a net total of \$169,000 to help wipe out the republican deficit after the 1920 elections but insisted that no inducement was offered to him. He said he had been a republican in politics, but did not know what he was.

Sinclair also said he thought Hays had lost some money in the stock market and that he had loaned him \$100,000 which he believed Hays sent to his broker as margin.

Low Mark for Fire Loss is Made in April

Marking of a new low record in fire runs for the city of Klamath Falls was revealed in the monthly report of Oak Bagg, assistant fire chief this morning. For the month ending on Monday, but three runs were made by the department with a total loss of \$535.95 incurred. The insurance risk on the three calls totaled \$4,550. All three fires caused by defective wiring.

The first call of the month was that which took the department to the Evans building on lower Main street where Herbert Green lost his life. The aged man attempted to return to the building for personal effects when he was overcome by smoke and was found in the burning building by members of the fire department. He passed away two days later in a local hospital.

The garage of E. D. Truelove, located at 2228 Eberlein brought the department out for the second call of the month. The loss at this fire amounted to \$25.

The C. W. Stephens home at 422 Mt. Pitt street was the third call. At this fire, 2 1/2 gallons of chemicals were used to extinguish the blaze.

Just after midnight on Monday a fire broke out at the residence of Tom Phillips at 873 California. The damage is rated at \$40. The cause of the fire has not yet been determined.

"This is the lowest number of calls answered by the department in more than two and one-half years," Borgs commented this morning.

cern. The project is being built from the cider pit—near the west boundary of the Geary ranch—towards Klamath Falls.

Mr. Henry made an important announcement today of additional construction on the Rock Creek road.

"Bear Wallow, that section of road which crosses a former strait and which is just beyond the Geary ranch, will be gravelled," he said. "This move is impelled because this section of road is easily made impassable by inclement weather under its present condition. Gravel will eliminate this possibility. The

same firm that is working on the ten mile surfacing contract will do this additional work."

Work on the Yonka Valley market road from a point near where the new Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway survey crosses, north to Hildebrand, is nearing completion. In fact it should be done inside of a week.

To round out the project a half-mile additional surfacing was accomplished making the improvement 2 1/2 miles long instead of 2 1/4 miles. L. F. Ireton is the contractor.

W. D. Miller Construction company is in the midst of surfacing a 5 1/2 mile section of the Langrell Valley market road system. This project will be completed within the near future.
