G. W. HOUSTON MAKES RUN OF 99 OUT OF 100

Klamath Scatter Gun Artists Make Good Records in Sunday Shoot

In one of the best individual performances ever staged at the Klamath Gun club grounds, H. E. Hauger, prominent automobile distributor, knocked over 112 straight clay pigeons and G. W. Houston, Klamath Falls business man, scored 99 straight.

It was the last bird of the 100 that Houston missed—not was the shot particularly difficult. That great 100 was no near that it was too far.

Hauger ran 112 straight; he missed the 113th and then scored up to 125 without missing another. His remarkable record for the day was 124 birds out of 125.

DAIRYMEN DEVISE PLAN FOR ACCREDITING HERDS

A plan for accrediting herds free of infectious abortion was made by the Oregon Dairymen's association in annual meeting at Fairview. This plan will soon be put into effect by the state livestock board. The Oregon experiment station with leading dairymen of the state conducted the experiments that resulted in this plan. The work, carried on since 1919, was made possible by special appropriations from the legislature.

Resolutions were passed recommending adequate inspection of all milk used for market purposes; urging creameries to adopt a system of grading cream, paying higher prices for better quality; and condemning the practice of creameries engaged in the business of selling butter substitutes, of creating an artificially high price of butter at certain seasons, thus stimulating use of oleomargarine.

Karasick Will Meet J. Woods In Mat Match

Long have Klamath fans waited and on May 11th their hopes will be realized when Al Karasick, Russian Hon, meets Jack Woods, the tough-tough sailor in the main event of a wrestling card in the new wrestling auditorium on Sixth and Klamath avenues.

Woods merits a match with the great Portland wrestler. He has won three successive matches in Klamath Falls. In his initial bout he flattened Henry Burke, Pelican City. In the second he pinned the shoulders of "Bull" Montana in two falls out of three. In the third and last match he sailed to a sensational victory over George Washburn.

Woods and Karasick will clash on the night of May 11th. Karasick needs no introduction. His feats at the expense of Professor Higami in a recent Klamath wrestling card, will long be remembered. Karasick is perhaps the roughest grappler in the game. When all else fails, his favorite stunt is to throw science and caution to the winds and attempt to throw his adversary to the ground. He has won two matches from the light-heavyweight champion, Ted Thye, and is regarded as one of the greatest light-heavyweights in the nation.

The wrestling matches are being given under the auspices of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. A wrestling tournament is being staged over a period of several months to determine the two men on the coast who are best fitted to wrestle it out for the light-heavyweight championship of the coast.

Periodically, especially around the time when sports in the way of Olympic trips are to be passed out, the A. A. U. is put up as a target for bands of snipers.

At the present time some authorities of the Western Conference, headed by Major John L. Griffith, athletic commissioner of the "Big Ten," are saying all kinds of mean things about the A. A. U. officials and refusing to support the campaign to raise funds for the Amsterdam expedition.

The A. A. U. is an autocratic body and it is not beyond suspicion of guilt in playing politics. Perhaps much of its authority and jurisdiction is self-imposed, but it has yet to be shown that any group of its critics could do a better job.

Theorists never will do any better. Dreamers would make a terrible mess of what always will be a bad situation as long as there are cheaters among the amateur athletes. And moralists and educators never will stop cheating.

It would seem logical for Major Griffith and his group to fight to keep the A. A. U. from getting control of the Olympic expeditions instead of trying to harness them after they are in charge and doing a pretty fair job of it. It is certainly not a practical method to begin when it is too late, and the trouble with the officials of the National Collegiate Athletic Association is that they never have been practical. They are all fine men, it must be admitted, but they do too much talking, theorizing and moralizing.

It is easy enough to tell what is wrong, but it is another thing to get in and correct the evil.

Could They Do Better? With all due respect to General Palmer Pierce, Alonzo Stagg, Major Griffith and other men of high character in the National Collegiate Association, it must be said that they have not shown any great capability in handling their own affairs, and it is to be doubted that they could handle a bigger job any better because any big job demands practical experience.

PLANT RED CLOVER NOW.

Now is the time to sow red clover on fall sown grain to give it an early start. If sown on frozen ground or before a heavy rain the seed usually becomes covered but harrowing is necessary if sowing is on dry ground. Usually 10 to 12 pounds per acre are broadcast.

CHICAGO WHITE SOX SCUTTLED BY N. Y. YANKS

Giants Suffer Second Second Straight Defeat; Browns Win Game

(By the Associated Press.) Sixty thousand persons, including the famous crew of the Bremen, watched the New York Yankees subdue the Chicago White Sox for the third day in a row, 4 to 2, at the Yankee stadium. Stanley Coveleski, veteran Pole, got credit for the Yankee victory, although he had to call for assistance from Mike Moore before the game was over.

Haskell Billings, Detroit's youthful pitching star, hurled the Tigers to a 3 to 0 victory over the Red Sox at Detroit yesterday.

Sam Gray registered his sixth win of the season when the St. Louis Browns turned back the Senators at Washington, 7 to 6, in a thrilling 11-inning game.

The New York Giants, National League leaders, suffered their second straight defeat at Cincinnati, 4 to 3, in 10 innings. The Reds played sensationally, completing four double plays. John McGraw announced that Vic Aldridge, left hander, had come to terms. At St. Louis the Cardinals and Brooklyn Robins divided a double header before 33,000 fans. Dizzy Vance allowed but six hits and fanned half a dozen in the first game but lost the decision to Grover Alexander and the Red Birds, 4 to 2. Ruethe's homer in the second inning gave the Cards an early lead. In the closing encounter Babe Herman's four-base drive with a man on base in the eighth enabled the Robins to nab a 5 to 4 decision. Large Dredge Founders Off Staten Island

NEW YORK, May 7. (AP)—The 2,000-ton government dredge Navesink with a crew of 47 men, sank off Clifton, Staten Island, after colliding with the liner Swinburne. Four men were reported missing.

Twenty-five were taken to the marine hospital on Staten Island where all but two remained for treatment.

Eighteen others swam ashore. It was reported, including Chief Engineer Clibbert, in charge of the dredging operations.

The dredge, in command of Captain Anderson, was working in the Double Channel recently in the ocean steamship line. She foundered in 400 feet of water.

First news of the accident was received in a radio message from the Swinburne as follows:

"U. S. Government dredge sinking at pier 17, 7 mile off channel, loaded with men. Dredge settling and men swimming around. Adriatic of White Star
