BASIN BOOSTED BY G. N. ROAD

Klamath Falls, the second largest shipping point in the state of Oregon, will presently be advertised at Great Northern stations throughout the country, because of the foresight of officials of the company in Klamath county.

Recently new time table schedules for the railroad which has just entered Klamath Falls were compiled, with notice that the time tables would be placed in all the Great Northern stations throughout the country. On the front page of the new folder is a brief history of Klamath Falls and the surrounding country.

The article advertises the fact that the Klamath basin has between 35 and 50 billion feet of merchantable yellow and sugar pine. The strides this district has made in diversified farming and dairying along with the 150,000 acres of land under irrigation are vividly described. Its lakes, excellent hotels, hunting, swimming, boating, fishing, golf, motoring and mountain climbing are included.

Crater lake national park, with its area of 259 square miles, located 52 miles from the city is advertised as one of the most beautiful scenic spots in the world.

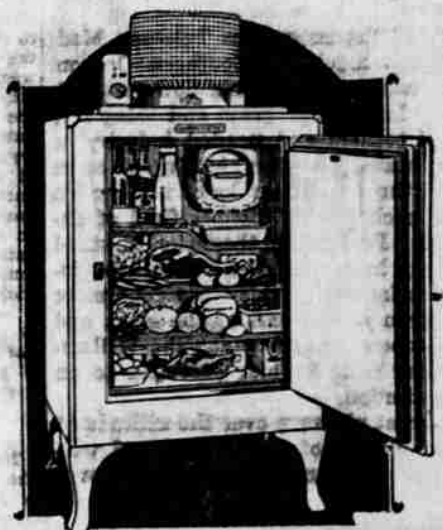
