Hands Clasp Across Mountain

As a further indication that Medford and Klamath Falls people are knowing each other better as the mists are cleared away, we have but to point to the visit of a delegation from Medford last evening, which came to learn what Medford can do to aid and assist Klamath Falls in her railroad celebration Friday and Saturday of this week.

They came in the same spirit that the pioneer neighbor went to the home of a settler to "sit a while" and see if everything was going well with that settler. And they returned home filled with enthusiasm for the celebration and determined to have several hundred of their townsmen attend.

The handclasp across the mountains between Medford and Klamath means much for Southern Oregon. As a whole, for they constitute the two big powers which will go forth in the development program and bring into this section the needed settlers and needed industry to make this part of the state take her rightful place in affairs. Commercially the two cities have nothing on which to disagree, for each has its distinct field of endeavor plainly marked. Politically, they should stand closer together than they have, and Bend should be included in a political association. If this were done more recognition would be given to this part of the state, and we would not have to depend entirely upon the Willamette valley for everything from a chief executive to an attendant at a state institution.

Klamath expresses great pleasure over the attitude of Medford, and sends a message of good cheer and welcome back by the special representatives who came over last night.

The New Skipper

When Mr. Piper passed on the great newspaper of Oregon—the Morning Oregonian of Portland—lost its managing head.

Now comes announcement from O. L. Price, manager of that newspaper, that R. G. Callvert, Mr. Piper's able assistant for many years, will assume control and direct the Oregonian's policies.

"Dick" Callvert is an able man. His training has been faultless and he possesses marked ability. As the new skipper to handle the ship we feel sure that the Oregonian will have a capable head. Horace Thomas, the news and city editor, will advance to executive news editor, and John L. Travis, assistant city editor, will become city editor.

Thus the gaps close up and men take their places. A newspaper must go on and on indefinitely. The passing of any one man, no matter how able and how beloved, must not stop the course of a newspaper.

The Bly Extension

N. H. Bogue, manager of the Strahorn railroad, which is now owned by the Southern Pacific and Great Northern jointly, has officially announced the Bly extension of the Strahorn. This is a 26½-mile addition to the line as it now stands, and will open a country rich with tonnage, will invite new lumber operations and will push a rail line that much nearer to Lakeview—a thing of importance to Klamath Falls and the entire basin.

The extension will have a strong bearing on agricultural development in the Bly country, where lands are low in price and irrigation is economical. While the Strahorn line is extending it would be well to put up the Langell branch line from Dairy. This is only a small undertaking, easy of construction, and it would give a rail outlet to the rich Langell valley, which today has its irrigation system built and only awaits modern transportation to ensure settlement.

Paternalism In Campaigns

We are fast drifting to the paternalistic campaign. This is being brought about by campaign expenses. Under our present system with population increasing it is found expensive to attempt to reach people directly. No state candidate in Oregon can make a campaign of interest and stay literally within the provisions of the state corrupt practices act. Nationally it is quite impossible for candidates to stay within a reasonable expense limit. Each campaign brings its scandal and people are growing tired of it.

Looking for a solution we get to political paternalism. By that we mean it is not unlikely that the state or nation during campaigns will provide funds for proper campaigning.

ANNOUNCE PLANS FOR O. C. & E. EXTENSION

SAN FRANCISCO, May 8, (AP)—Plans for the extension of the Oregon, California and Eastern railroad from Sprague River to Bly, Oregon, a distance of 26½ miles, were announced here by N. H. Bogue, general manager

and chief engineer for the company. The road is jointly owned by the Southern Pacific and the Great Northern railroads. The new line will afford an outlet for timber stands east of Sprague River.

WORSE THAN FOLLY

New York World: The house naval affairs committee in framing a bill appropriating \$740,000,000 for ship construction voted almost unanimously to strike out a provision that "in the event of an international conference for the limitation of naval construction" the president might suspend part or all of the ordered construction. So modified, the bill provides for a building program which must be begun within five years and must be completed within eight years. If it is passed as it stands, if Mr. Coolidge signs a measure divesting himself and his successors of a solution power, congress will be placed in the attitude of seeking to bind the action of future congresses no matter how the international skies may brighten, and to make sure that if a future president shall have more common sense than congress he shall not be permitted to use it for the public good.

This is more than waste; it is profligacy. It is worse than folly; it is madness. It is a provocative gesture for which there is not a shadow of reason in any part of the horizon of world politics. We do not need such a building policy now. To seek to tie the hands of congress and the president in any future time when the folly of such jingoism may be even more apparent is the height of stupidity. The peace-loving people of this country should make their displeasure at such a proposal so clearly known in Washington that congress will not dare to enter upon an eight year effort to foreign nations so reckless of possible consequences, so prodigal and so wicked.

LATEST STAMP IS INCORRECT SAYS HUGHES

NEW YORK, May 8, (AP)—The New York World today quotes Rupert Hughes, Washington biographer, as protesting against a stamp showing the first president kneeling in prayer in the snow at Valley Forge. Such an issue of two cent stamps goes on sale May 26 in commemoration of the 150th anniversary of the wintering of Washington's army at Valley Forge.

"While I was not at Valley Forge with Washington," Hughes wired from Hollywood, "and cannot disprove the fable that, instead of praying decently in his own hut, he went out and shouted aloud in the snowy wood lot, there is no proof that Isaac Potts, who started the tale, was there either."

until 1853. Eleven Californians had undertaken once more the search for the famous, perhaps fabulous, Lost Cabin mine. For many years parties had been searching the Cascades; again they had come into the Klamath region. With all their secrecy their object became known, and a party of Oregonians was hastily organized to stalk them and share their find. The Californians discovered the pursuit and divided their party. The Oregonians did the same. It became a game of hide and seek. When provisions were nearly exhausted and many of both parties deserted, they joined forces.

"Suddenly we came in sight of water," writes J. W. Hillman, then the leader of the combined party. "We were much surprised, as we did not expect to see any lakes and did not know but that we had come in sight of and close to Klamath Lake. Not until my mule stopped within a few feet of the rim of Crater Lake, did I look down, and if I had been riding a blind mule I firmly believe I would have ridden over the edge to death."

"It is interesting that the discoverers quarreled on the choice of a name, dividing between Mysterious Lake and Deep Blue Lake. The advocates of Deep Blue Lake won the vote, but in 1869 a visiting party from Jacksonville named it Crater Lake, and this by natural right became its title."

get an idea about what this city intends to pull next Friday and Saturday.

When it was explained to this delegation from across the mountains in detail they were delighted, and at once pledged the high school band of 26 pieces to be in the parade. Moreover, the Elks band will be here on Thursday night, and all the Elks of the party began to urge that the Elks band stay over and take part in the celebration. Also, the Legion drum corps is about in the notion to come from Medford and bring the good old bugle of good fellowship along to enliven the occasion.

"There is no guesswork about the high school band," remarked Ted Baker, secretary and generalissimo of the Medford chamber. "That is a sure shot and we believe we can help on the other two organizations. I want to say also that the Craterians will be over in a body and they will do some fancy steps and show you how to march under the scorching sun of a Klamath day, for these fellows are past masters in the art of formation and figure weaving. They are going to attend all the Klamath celebration for they have leased a Pullman car from the Southern Pacific and will occupy that while in the city and on Saturday evening they will order 'Rosy' to switch the car onto a fast train and go to Dunsmuir for a night out of the state. Observe, I say 'Rosy' when I mean Mr. Rosebaum, general agent for the Southern Pacific, for that is the name we all know him by across the hills. He has been in Medford for a long time and we take a lot of liberty with him, more so than we would think of doing with any other railroad official."

The Medford party drove back last night as the thunderstorm gathered.

Main street from second to Twelfth may be closed to parking during the Great Northern celebration from noon on Friday to four p. m. Saturday.

DIRIGIBLE TO LEAVE IN WEEK

COPENHAGEN, May 8, (AP)—The dirigible Italia was undergoing repairs at its hangar at Kings Bay, Spitzbergen, today as General Umberto Nobile completed preparations to leave for the north pole within a week.

One engine needed repair as did the envelope which was torn at the bow when landing at Vadsø, Norway.

The ship has finished what in some ways was regarded as the most difficult part of the voyage, General Nobile said in a radio message to the National Tidende of Copenhagen.

"Within a week we hope to do what has never been done before, explore a real air line between this island and the north pole," he continued. After announcing that the trip to Kings Bay had justified the faith of the explorers in the airship he added: "The cross given by the pope will be planted on the top of the world while we all kneel, thanking God."

MARYLAND WET NOT ACTIVE IN 1928 CAMPAIGN

BALTIMORE, May 8, (AP)—Governor Albert C. Ritchie of Maryland, told the senate campaign funds committee today that he had made no race for the democratic presidential nomination and did not expect to be selected as his party's standard bearer.

He added, however, that he expected the Maryland democratic convention which is to meet May 22 to instruct the delegates to Houston to vote for him. Asked if he would seek to obtain any delegates outside of his state, the governor replied that if he had any political friends at the Texas city he would not hesitate to ask them to throw delegates his way.
