ATHLETICS AND YANKEES DUEL FOR TOP RANK

Babe Ruth Hammers Out Seventh Home Run; Philadelphia Wins

Sensational winning streaks by the New York Yankees and Philadelphia Athletics threaten to turn the American league pennant struggle into a duel instead of a free for all.

The Athletics, after losing their first four games have won 13 of their last 13. The Yankees have lost two of their last 13.

George Herman Ruth propelled his seventh homer of the season into the leftfield bleachers at the Yankee stadium yesterday, scoring behind two teammates and giving the Yankees a 4 to 2 win over Cleveland.

The Athletics hammered out an 11 to 1 verdict over the St. Louis Browns at Philadelphia. Joe Hauser hit his sixth homer of the campaign. Bing Miller also batted in with one.

Bob Fothergill led the Detroit Tigers to a ten inning victory over the Senators at Washington, 6 to 5. Bob got three hits, two of them doubles, scored one run and drove in three more.

The Boston Red Sox returned to the league cellar by dropping a 3 to 2 battle to the Chicago White Sox.

WALTER HAGEN LEADS ENGLISH OPEN TOURNEY

Three Americans and One Briton Hold First Four Places in Match

SANDWICH, Eng., May 11. (A. P.)—With 2,000 spectators, including the Prince of Wales, at his heels, Walter Hagen, American "professional," rounded St. George's in 72 for a total of 220 taking the lead today in the third round of the British open golf championship.

As the fourth and final round started, one home hope remained to beat back the attack of three Americans, two from the north and one from the south. Archie Compston was left to carry the British burden.

Hagen, improving steadily as the title test progressed, shot 72 in the third round to assume lead of the reduced field of 50 with a 54 hole score of 226. Just on stroke back was Gene Sarazen, tied with Jose Jurado of Argentina, at 221, with Compston, the great Briton, in fourth place with 222.

Hagen started like a whirlwind covering the first nine holes in 33, two under par. He took 39 in last his 72, his best round of the championship play.

KLAMATH FALLS FOURTH IN STATE CONSTRUCTION

Klamath Falls rose one point on the state construction list last month in volume of building activity, according to the S. W. Straus monthly building survey for April.

The city ranked fourth among the cities of Oregon during April, and is preceded by Portland, first; Salem, second, and Eugene, third. Klamath ranked fifth in building for March, but in April, 1927, it ranked third with a total amount of \$204,995.

The ratings for last April are: Portland, \$1,589,495; Salem, \$260,518; Eugene, \$102,200; Klamath Falls, \$72,940; La Grande, \$65,265; Medford, \$67,150; Marshfield, \$4,176; Astoria, \$3,470.

Won't Be a Tough Summer For Prizefight Champions

Out of the seven or more world's championship fights that Tex Rickard is arranging for the summer amusement of the gamblers there should come one or two new champions. That is, if there is anything in what the boys call the law of averages or tribal agreements limiting the tenure in a pugilistic office.

Looking back over the files it can be seen that Rickard is almost bound by word to produce two or three new champions out of his extravagant program, for in one of those moments when he becomes author he named some of the boys who are now booked to work for him as being overdue for a successor.

Last winter when he turned to his typewriter and pounded out his All-American team, Rickard hedged. He said Samuel Lazzerro of Baltimore and Samuel Mandello of Rockford were found on his team but they wouldn't be there very long. It was a rather broad inference that Lazzerro and Mandello were booked expertly for a socking out from under the champion's crown.

Lazzerro, better known as Joe Dundee, the welterweight champion, and Mandello, who dropped the "o" in his name long before he became lightweight champion, are among the seven champions who will toll soon in defense of their titles. It is to be wondered if their employer still has such low regard of their chances to escape annihilation.

It is quite likely that Rickard has changed his mind by this time and that those who agreed with his expert appraisal of the fighters last winter have changed their minds, too.

Mandello probably will be the only one of the seven champions who will not enter the ring a nice favorite to win. His match against Jimmy McLarnin is the only one of the seven that looks like real competition and McLarnin is one of those products of sentimental New York frenzies like Jack Delaney was.

Because of this great fancy that New York has taken to McLarnin and because the young Irishman is a hitter of known power, the lightweight championship fight on May 17 probably will be the artistic and financial success of the season. And this is said with all due respect to dear Gene Tunney.

Playing the champion, in cases where the champion is any good at all, is held to be the safest risk in pugilistic betting operations. We would bet on the champion in every fight this summer if we were to bet.

That goes for Mandell, too, as we believe that the handsome little lightweight champion is one of the most underestimated and most underrated fighters of the day. McLarnin is a nice little fellow and all that but Mandell ought to be too smart and too fast

for him. Some say that Mandell will have to run to win, but so does our Gene.

Dundee, to take up his case, may not have the respect of the public but the fighters in his class apparently think a lot of him because Rickard, having a task to get an opponent for him, may have to select Sammy Baker. Ace Hudkins annoyed the life out of Dundee while the champion was in bad with the boxing commissions of New York and California, but, as soon as the wraps were taken off him, Hudkins said he had a sore hand. Later he signed up to fight Mickey Walker in Chicago.

If, for courtesy alone, some mention should be made of the heavyweight championship, it is hereby mentioned. Our Gene ought to win. He's too great a runner for any of the big boys and when he picked Tom Heeney as his opponent he certainly did not choose a man fast enough on his dogs to catch up with him.

Tommy Loughran will have to defend his light-heavyweight championship against Leo Lomski or Jack Slattery and it is just too bad. Loughran scared Jack Delaney clear out of the division. He not only can beat any man in the class but he could give dear Gene all Gene would want.

Bud Taylor, in defending the bantam-weight championship against Kid Francis or Johnny Boulevardo is a cinch if he hasn't gone good, and we believe that Frankie Genaro is too old and shopworn to take the flyweight championship from Izzy Schwartz.

Tod Morgan might be plastered if he were defending the junior lightweight championship against any other than Eddie "Cannonball" Martin. We can't figure how long ago it was that Martin was a poor champion of a very poor bantamweight class and his kind don't improve with age. Morgan is ready for a killing but Martin doesn't look like the killer.

That bunch of seven arranged by Rickard doesn't look like the anticipated tough summer for champions.
