House of David To Cash in on Court Notoriety

Longbeards Hope To Attract Tourists Through Trial's Publicity

Editor's Note—Herewith is the last of the United Press series of articles on the House of David the strange religious cult which has surprised all "unbelievers" by flourishing even after its "immortal" prophet, King Benjamin Farnell, died.

BENTON HARBOR, Mich., May 12. (UP)—Confident of defeating the state's efforts to force them into receivership, the long-haired Israelites of the House of David are making ready to flaunt their notoriety before the summer flow of tourists and thus add to the \$7,000,000 institution which "King Ben" established.

Under Benjamin's rule, the strange religious colony grew and prospered, attracting tourists from near and far and charging substantial prices for views and refreshment.

But before he died, King Benjamin became the target of the state of Michigan which accused him of practicing immoralities under the guise of religious ceremonies. The state won a receivership suit against the colony, but an appeal is pending before the supreme court and the colony is confident of a reversal.

And so a crew of whiskered laborers is at work remodeling the large theatre and adding to the grandstand of the baseball park in anticipation of record business this summer. The 500 remaining members of the cult are confident of completing the "gathering of the 144,000 children of Israel," believing that the notoriety brought to the colony by charges of immorality will increase their power.

"We have been tormented by an unbelieving world but we will go on to glory," said Tohams Rowe, an aged man who brought his wife and children from Australia 23 years ago to join the colony. Rowe is one of the "four pillars"—the cult's governing board.

"We are confident," said Rowe "that this summer will find greater crowds than ever before. Last summer when we were under attack in the courts we were scarcely able to take care of the crowds."

The writer somewhat cautiously approached the subject of King Benjamin's death.

"Will Benjamin's passing bring more of these tourists?"

"Oh, it probably will," Rowe replied, "but understand we never have exploited Benjamin and never shall."

His statement was taken to refer to rumors about Benton Harbor that the mummified body

The House of David colony is on the outskirts of Benton Harbor, a popular Michigan resort city located on the shore of Lake Michigan in the center of the rich fruit belt. In addition to the colony proper, the cult owns a hotel building in the business district of Benton Harbor, several store buildings, High Island in upper Michigan, four fertile farms in Michigan and one in Canada, and a small branch colony in Australia, operated by 33 Israelites.

"Take it from me, I know," Corbett said. "Tunney defeated a great idol and the public will remember his predecessor a long time. I went through the same thing. He isn't of the type that the public fancies as a champion."

Corbett, when he becomes confident, lets you know that he has a few sore spots about the way the public handled him when he was in the spot that Tunney is in now.

"I tried seriously to improve the business and all I got was a lot of laughs," he said. "I used to drink milk and water in public when the heroes were drinking champagne and to tell the truth I would much rather have had some good strong drink but I wouldn't do it."

Public Likes 'Em Rough
