NATIONALS HAD NO EXCITEMENT

With three Indian scalps in their locker, the Philadelphia Athletics were tuned up today for a chase after the flying Yankees in what still may be called the American league race. The Boston Red Sox trimmed the Tigers by 5 to 4 in 11 innings yesterday in one of the only two scheduled games in the American league. The Tigers have dropped six straight.

The Athletics enjoyed a field day against the Indians, winning 15-2. Cobb and Hale hit homers for the Athletics after Ponsessa had driven one over the fence for Cleveland.

Rube Walberg won his fifth consecutive game.

The victory gave the Mackmen the odd game in five against the Indians after Cleveland had won the first two.

All was quiet along the National league front yesterday. The schedule called for games in Pittsburgh and St. Louis, but rain prevented both contests. The games shifted today for the start of the get-away series of the first western invasion by the east.

Shahan's boot of Ray French's throw in the eighth inning paved the way for a Portland rally that netted them six runs and a 10-7 decision over Sacramento. WILDCAT PETE TRIES AGAIN FOR WRESTLER TITLE

EUGENE, Oregon, May 17.—George Wildcat Pete will be given one more chance to win the world championship junior middleweight wrestling title. This was decided here today when Dick Reed, matchmaker, signed Henry Jones, title holder, for a return match with the wildcat. The event will be staged at the armory here Saturday, May 19th.

Pete met Jones here last week but through a queer quirk of nature lost the championship after having it in his grasp. The champion took the first fall when he threw wildcat out of the ring. Pete then took the second with a combination of an airplane spin which missed but gave him an opportunity for a catch hold.

Then after 17 minutes of the most sensational grappling ever witnessed here the champion barely won back his crown. Pete applied a series of headlocks for five minutes and had Jones almost ready to pin on the mat. But in the final grab the wildcat let one arm slip down. Jones grabbed it and in the flash of an eye slipped on his torturing whip wristlock. He threw the wildcat over his head and pinned him for the fall.

In doing this he put forth his last ounce of energy and after winning the match lay on the mat, unable to walk to his corner.

Reed was forced to post a \$600 guarantee to sign Jones for a return match with Pete. As he believes the wildcat deserves another shot at the crown the matchmaker made this offer.

AMERICA'S LADY GOLFER BEATEN

HUNSTANTON, England, May 17. (AP)—America's sole surviving representative in the British women's open golf tournament, Mrs. Dorothy Campbell Hurd, was eliminated 3 and 2 by Miss Judith Fowler today.

Mrs. Hurd survived yesterday's stormy weather only to be defeated under much more favorable golfing conditions today. She seemed to play wearily from the start, but nevertheless played her long shots well all the way around. It was her putting, together with several brilliant shots by Miss Fowler that put her out of the championship races.

After the first hole today Mrs. Hurd had a string of ill luck and was bunkered twice on the second hole while after one slip on the fourth green Miss Fowler's putter never failed her. Mrs. Hurd played the eighth and ninth excellently, taking both holes, but she slipped on the tenth and 14th. Mrs. Hurd had made a brave effort to square the match at the ninth, but then Miss Fowler unleashed a birdie at the tenth, captured the fourteenth when Mrs. Hurd barely missed a 13 footer, and then sealed the defeat of the American on the sixteenth by getting another birdie 2. It was at this same hole that Miss Collett went down to defeat yesterday.

NEW YORK, May 17. M'DUFFEE HAS GOOD BILL UP

Stanley Rogers, the husky grappler from Medford who was and is very eager to take on Karasick, Woods, any grappler who has appeared in the series of cards which Matchmaker McDuffee has been staging, will have a chance to strut his stuff next Saturday night, when he will go to the mat with Don Nolan at the veteran's gymnasium. Nolan, a heavyweight from Marshfield, has the name of being a hard man to handle, and guarantees to give Rogers all he wants.

Sailor Jack Woods won considerable unfavorable comment on his match with Karasick, because of slugging the Russian. The next night, however, he wrestled as clean a match as could be desired with Chet Wiles, the wrestling copper of Portland. Matchmaker McDuffee last night announced two speedy preliminaries to warm up the fans for the principal events of Saturday evening's mat program. SPORTSMATTER

NEW YORK, May 17. (UP)—Already the agitation for starting the baseball season a week or two later each spring is dying down and by the time August rolls around there probably will be no one left to squawk against mid-April inaugurations.

Year after year, with many postponements due to inclement weather, there has arisen a mighty but only transitory cry from fans and ball players.

Rain and cold—sometimes even snow—conspire to ruin festivities and double-headers pile up. Suggestions are made that the openings be postponed each year to May 1.

But the fact is that weather in both the east and middle-west, where all the major league teams are located, is an uncertain quantity not only in late April but in early May. There have been plenty of instances where clubs played through their entire April schedule only to run into flood-gates of rain in May.

And since the fans seem capable of supporting a schedule of 154 games a season, there appears no reason for shortening the number of games to 149. After all, double-headers usually draw so well that they make up for the early season losses.

The only valid argument against the mid-April start is the fact that cold weather causes so much illness among the players. This year the sick-list of nearly all the clubs was especially large. But even the players themselves forget their grievances when the summer heat enters the picture.

A contributor to a local newspaper column has discovered that Gene Tunney's hobby is anything with a William in it. He points to William Gibson, William Egan, William McCabe, William McAvoy, William O. McGeehan, William Muldoon, William Lyon Phelps and William Shakespeare. And, of course, William Harrison Dempsey.

Early returns indicate that Connie Mack may have made a mistake in letting pitcher Sam Gray get away from the Athletics in the trade that brought Outfielder "Bing" Miller from the Browns. Gray's early victories showed that he has not lost his skill on the mound.

But according to apparently well-founded reports Mack and Gray did not get along together and too well and elimination of club dissension is sometimes worth any price.

The arrival of Archie Compston, conqueror of Walter Hagen, in the United States some time before the American open golf championship is held at Chicago on June 21 probably will be the signal for a series of challenges. Macdonald Smith entered his challenge early. The members of the Lakeville club in Great Neck, N. Y., where Smith is pro, expressed themselves willing to back Compston for "any amount" in a 72-hole match. Half of the match would be played at Lakeville and the other 36 holes at any course selected by the long-driving Briton.

HARNES THROWS REED

PORTLAND, May 17. (AP)—George Barnes, Multnomah club wrestling instructor, took two falls from Jack Reed, New York light heavyweight grappler here last night. Reed won the first fall in 24 minutes, 15 seconds with a series of headlocks. It was all Barnes' after that, he taking the second fall in 12 minutes, 50 seconds after whirling Reed around with an ordinary bear hug and falling on him. The third and deciding fall was over in less than five minutes after Barnes wore Reed down with a series of headlocks. Chet Wiles and Rudy Warner wrestled one hour to a draw, neither man taking a fall.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 17. (AP)—Portland wholesale produce markets were rather quiet today with prices generally steady. Strawberries continued to move freely at fancy figures for locals. Supplies were nominal as the cooler weather of the last two days has not ripened as many berries as during the previous warm spell. Reports from growing districts, however, point to an earlier season on berries than was expected. In several regions it is reported that yields will be light.
Green peas from Roseburg made their first appearance on the market and met with excellent demand on account of the fine quality. They were selling at 12½c per pound.
On the country dressed meat market, lamb were decidedly weak with quotations on springers fully 2c lower. Pork was also a little easier, most sales of light hogs fetching 14c although a few choice lights brought as high as 14½c. Other classes were steady.
Poultry prices were steady and unchanged.
No fluctuations in butter and egg values were marked up to today, but both markets were firm with trading active. Yesterday's receipts were: Butter 24,127 pounds; eggs 2,103 cases. Storage holdings last night were reported at 150,752 pounds of butter and 49,412 cases of eggs.

said of Tex Rickard that he would end up broke. Most big gamblers do.

No one knows Rickard intimately. His business always has been his own. No one knew whether he had a million at his command or was down to a dime. Perhaps he didn't know himself, because money always has been a slight matter with him.

Only once, and that was very recently, did Rickard bring his personal affairs into a conversation and then he intimated that he had accumulated a pile of a million and a half in reserve and that he couldn't spend his salary and income for stock in the Garden.

He should have three times that sum if he dealt always for maximum profit instead of rating the kick he got out of promotion as being personal profit. The proper return on his investment was not always considered and that caused him to differ seriously with the important Wall Street men in the Garden enterprise.

The directors of the Garden wanted the cash on the right side of the books instead of the glory of being the world's greatest promoters. Rickard was satisfied in Chicago when there was better than \$500,000 left out of the near \$3,000,000 gate, but the directors raised the devil about it.
