PLYE'S WALKERS FACING A LONG JOURNEY TODAY

BRADFORD, Pa., May 18. (AP)—C. C. Pyle's bantamers faced the 53 mile trip to Wellsville, N. Y., today with equalingly born of the fact that the trek brings them that much closer to the final goal, New York. The race will end at Madison Square Garden Saturday, May 26.

GREAT DERBY IS VERY POPULAR

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 18. (A. P.)—Thousands of visitors crowded the hotels and streets today as Louisville made last minute preparations for the fifty-fourth renewal of the Kentucky derby.

By private car, airplane, automobile, day coach and even on horseback, the throng poured into the city.

The only rooms available in larger hotels were those for which reservations had been made months ago. As more than 70,000 visitors were expected for the classic event every spare bed will be in use.

Rains which had fallen intermittently since Tuesday afternoon let up last night but not until Churchill Downs track had been converted into a river of mud and the professional tipsters thrown into a panic on account of the changed odds that a derby course might make in the heavy lineup.

Owners and trainers indicated that probably 21 thoroughbreds would start although the exact number depended upon the conditions of the track.

Reigh Count, Mrs. John D. Hertz' thoroughbred, continued to be an overwhelming favorite, even gaining additional support when it was announced that the colt was as good in the mud as on a light, fast course. Toro, E. B. McLean's candidate, and Martie Flynn, the Stuyvesant entry, probably ranked next to the count with Louisville players.

Carried along by the momentum furnished by an 11 game winning streak the Chicago Cubs serenely sat atop the National league ladder today.

First place fell from the grasp of the Cincinnati Reds yesterday when they bowed to Brooklyn, 4 to 3, while the Cubs were chewing up the Boston Braves, 2 to 0.

The Cubs started their sensational spurt on May 5 after they had lost 12 of their first 21 games. During the 11 game spurge they have scored 51 runs, collected 81 hits, committed but eight errors and limited the opposition to 29 tallies.
